CENTRE COUNTY MAN'S BODY FOUND IN BALD EAGLE CREEK

The body of Chester Irvin Weaver, 22 who disappeared at Crystal Beach near Mill Hall, early Sunday morning a week ago, was recovered from Bald Eagle Creek shortly after 3 o'clock Friday afternoon.

It was found near the dam about two and one-half miles below Crystal Beach by Mrs. Adam Rippey of Lock Haven who was fishing in the creek with her husband.

The body was taken to the Neff Funeral Parlor in Howard, where members of the family definitely identified it.

Death was said to have been due to accidental drowning. It was believed that Weaver, who was described as being intoxicated when last seen alive, wandered and fell into the creek, which is deep and almost ever with the bank at Crystal Beach.

The creek in that section was dragged every day last week by more than thirty friends and relatives of Weaver. WPA men also aided in the search.

Weaver, who resided in Romola, Centre county, went to Lock Haven Saturday night previous to his disappearance, later going to Crystal Beach with James Delaney of Lock Haven. Delaney left at 12:30 a. m. Sunday and at 3:45 a. m. Weaver was last seen wandering outside the pavilion by a Bellefonte couple.

His automobile, containing his wife, pocketbook and groceries, was found abandoned and unlocked a short time later, leading authorities to institute a search.

Weaver, an equipment operator for the state highway department, is survived by his wife, one small child, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Weaver, and four sisters and four brothers.

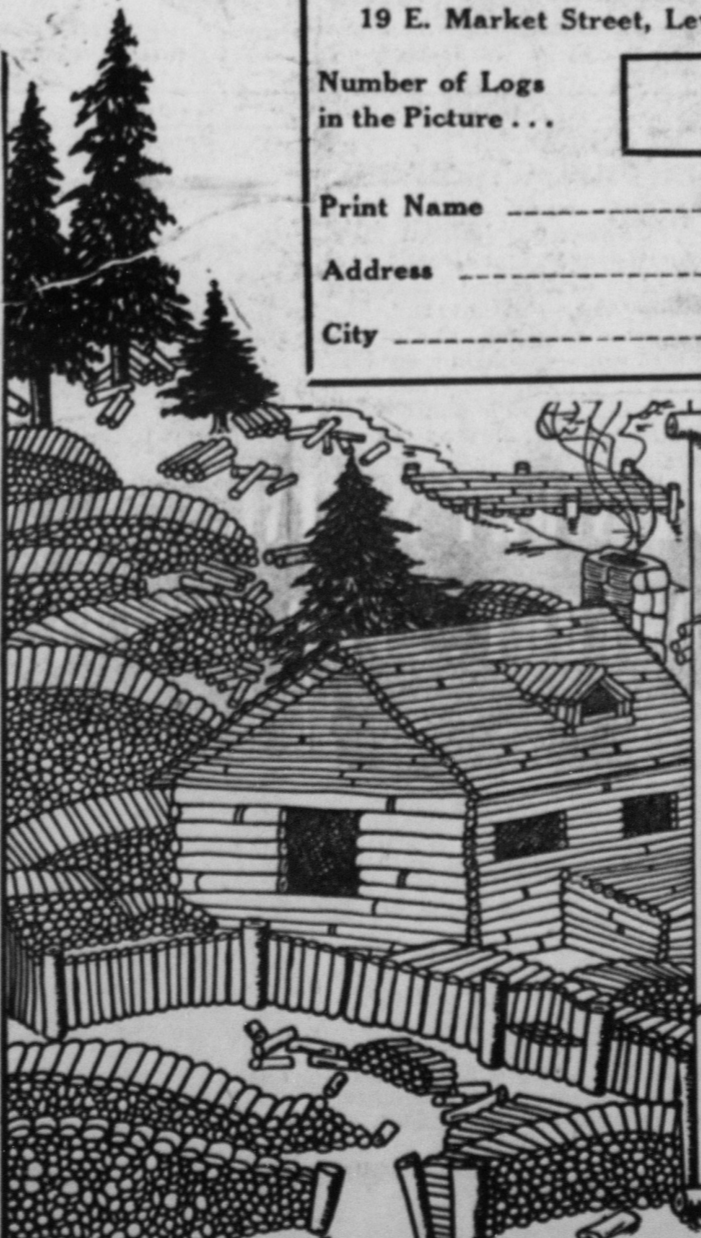
