Scores of communities throughout the Commonwealth voted against the sale of beer and almost 60 voted against liquor in Tuesday's primaries, according to unofficial and incomplete tabulations. Eighty-nine communities voted against beer and 71 against liquor while 58 voted for beer and 43 for liquor. "Sentiment is definitely turning towards the dregs," commented Mrs. Ella B. Black, president of the Pennsylvania W. C. T. U.

BIBBLE.—Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Bible, 73, resident of Altoona, died suddenly Saturday night at the home of D. C. Rossman in West Buffalo township, Union county where she had been a guest for several months. Death resulted from a stroke suffered Friday evening.

Mrs. Bible, who was 73 years of age, was born at Potters Mills, a daughter of William W. and Sarah Rankin Royer. January 29, 1884 she was married at Potters Mills to Mr. Bible, who died in 1933, surviving are her daughter, Mrs. Bowles, two sisters, Mrs. Christie J. Smith of Bellefonte and Mrs. C. E. Saunders, of Juniata. Two grandchildren and three great-grandchildren also survive. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Lafferty funeral parlors, Altoona.

WARING.—Edmund Waring, Sr., died at his home in Pittsburgh on Wednesday of last week, following several months' illness with a complication of diseases.

Mr. Waring was a son of William Griffith and Melinda (Coble) Waring and was born in Boalsburg, July 9, 1849. His father was the first president of the Farmers High School, which later became the Penna. State College. He was twice married. His first wife was Miss Lydia Beyer, deceased; his second wife was Miss Mary Weston, who survives.

Ten children were born to the first marriage, all of whom survive. To the second union two children survive. Mr. Waring was the last of his immediate family. Burial was made at Tyrone.

SPIGELMAYER.—George Ralph Spigelmyer, 91, one of the best known and highly respected residents of Bellefonte, died Wednesday morning of last week of complications incident to advancing age. Death came in the J. S. Askins home at Unionville, where he had lived for the past year.

Mr. Spigelmyer established a store in Woodward in the early 70's. In 1881 he and his wife removed to Spring Mills, and eight years later they went to Bellefonte where Mr. Spigelmyer began a department store which in its day was something of a big business venture. It was known as "The Racket" and gave employment to 23 clerks. The "Variety Shop" was also one of Mr. Spigelmyer's successes.

He is survived by one daughter Mrs. Willard Hall, of Harrisburg, and one brother, Jerome, of Millheim. Funeral services were held Friday evening and burial was made at Hartleton, Saturday morning.

BERNSTEIN.—Mrs. Lena Bernstein, mother of Sid Bernstein, Bellefonte merchant, died at her home in Philadelphia from a blood clot on the brain caused by a fall in her home a few days before her death.

CCC TRUCK UPSETS NEAR REEDSVILLE; 25 INJURED

Eleven members of the Veterans' CCC Camp at Farrisandville, Clinton county, were seriously injured and 14 others received slight injuries about 8:30 o'clock Sunday night when a truck in which they were riding upset on a sharp curve near Reedsville.

Those admitted to the hospital in Lewisport include: Oscar Riley, 46, possible fracture left hip and rib; Emil Buehrt, fractured shoulder and rib; Valentine Leone, 54, possible fractured back and rib; Earl Lewis, 40, possible fractured back, ribs and jaw; Anthony Carlvage, 50, chest and back injuries; Stephen Chinchar, 56, back injuries; David Adams, 49, possible fractured jaw and leg; Maurice Mehanne, 44, possible fractured ribs; Harry Caff, 58, injuries of left forearm.

Fourteen others were treated for lesser injuries and discharged.

FIRE DESTROYS RILEY CAMP IN BEAR MEADOWS

The Riley hunting camp in the Bear Meadows was destroyed by fire of unknown origin Friday evening at 5 o'clock.

Riley Hunter, of near Boalsburg noticed smoke rising from the mountain and drove to Little Flat, fire tower to determine the origin. Locating the fire, he drove to the locality and found the camp completely destroyed.

The building was erected in 1915 but members of the group had camped many years before at the same spot, using tents. Many Boalsburg hunters were counted among its members and George and James Searson of Centre Hall also owned shares in the property.

An investigation is being conducted and some men reported that the water pump had been disabled before the fire. The camp was covered by insurance until this year but the policy had not been renewed.

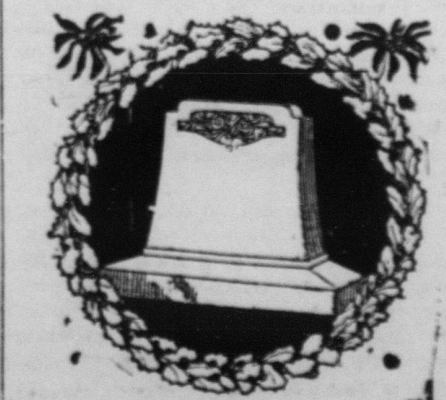
