### DOG OWNERS, AND LICENSES.

Sept. 26, 1907—

is believed could be economically supplied by the Department's Prison Industries Division.

Proponents of the plan point out an ideal range for raising cattle is available at Rockview which could easily be made adaptable for a herd sufficiently large to meet some of the institutional requirements.

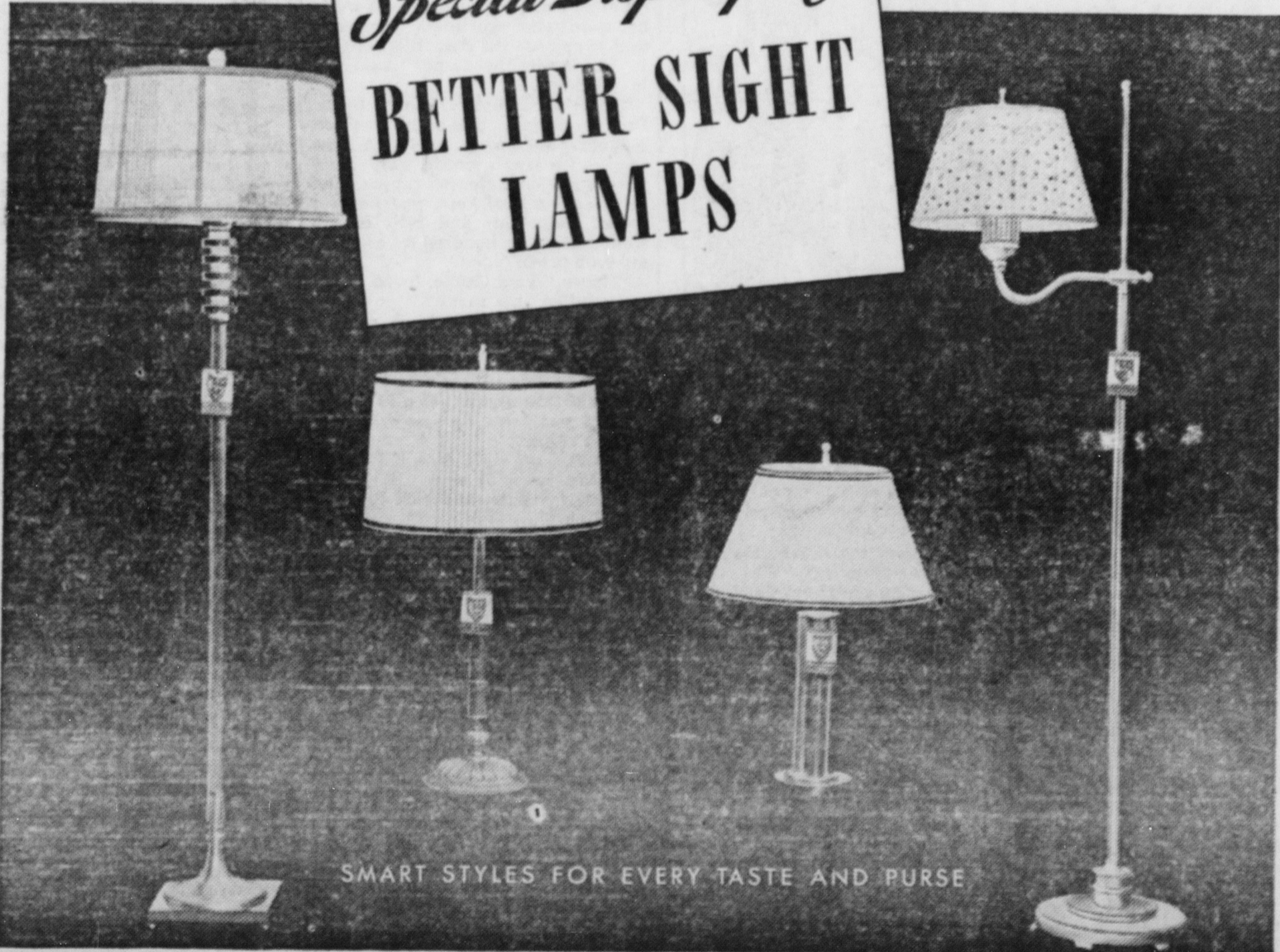

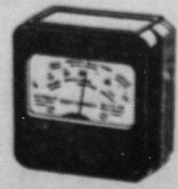

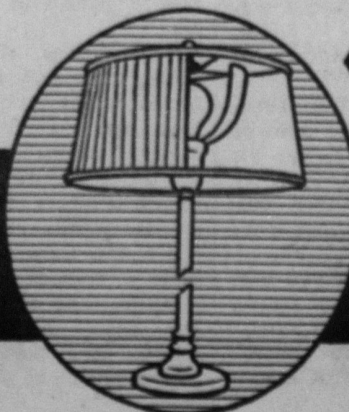
