BURRIS.—Mrs. Annie Coble Burris wife of Lanson J. Burris, died at her home in Centre Hall Sunday night at 11:30 o'clock, following a lengthy illness from a complication of diseases.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, at the house, and interment made in the local cemetery. Rev. Seth W. Russell of the Methodist Episcopal church, of which denomination deceased was a member, officiated.

Mrs. Burris was a daughter of the late Benjamin Franklin Coble and Elizabeth Coble, and was born at Marklesburg, July 7, 1874, hence was aged 63 years, 2 months and 26 days. She was a skilled seamstress in her earlier life and before her marriage was employed in the Doheny home, wealthy oil magnate, on the Pacific coast.

She was married to Mr. Burris about sixteen years ago and lived here during all her married life. Surviving, besides her husband, are two sisters—Mrs. Julius Walls and Mrs. Mollie Kipe, both of Marklesburg.

CARTER.—Fredrick K. Carter, former resident of Centre Hall, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John M. Luse, in State College on Monday at 12:35 p. m. from complications, following an illness of one month.

The son of Abraham and Rebecca Krumrine Carter, he was born in State College April 20, 1855, making his age 82 years, 5 months and 14 days. Mr. Carter married Caroline Feidler, who preceded him in death 13 years ago, and Mrs. Luse is the only survivor. He was a member of the State College Evangelical church.

Items of news which interested those of a generation ago, taken from the files of The Reporter, year 1907.

At a recent meeting of the Ferguson township school board, Prof. Stine of Harrisburg was elected teacher of the high school at Pine Grove Mills. Ninety-seven tons of hay and straw were baled on the farm of E. M. Huyett, west of Centre Hall. Perry H. Luse, tenant, has been hauling it to the station during the past week. The timothy hay is bringing \$15 a ton.

Wm. M. Grove purchased the Jas. Letzoff property consisting of a house and lot located opposite Long's store, Spring Mills.

Miss Bessie Grove and sister, Mrs. Zettie, experienced a runaway Monday evening while on their way from the Grove home to Spring Mills. They were driving the family horse and on reaching a point below Edward Grenoble's the buggy passed over some obstacle that frightened the animal, which started to run at breakneck speed. After a half mile's speeding the horse was pulled into a fence, where he tore loose from the buggy. The occupants were unharmed, but greatly frightened.

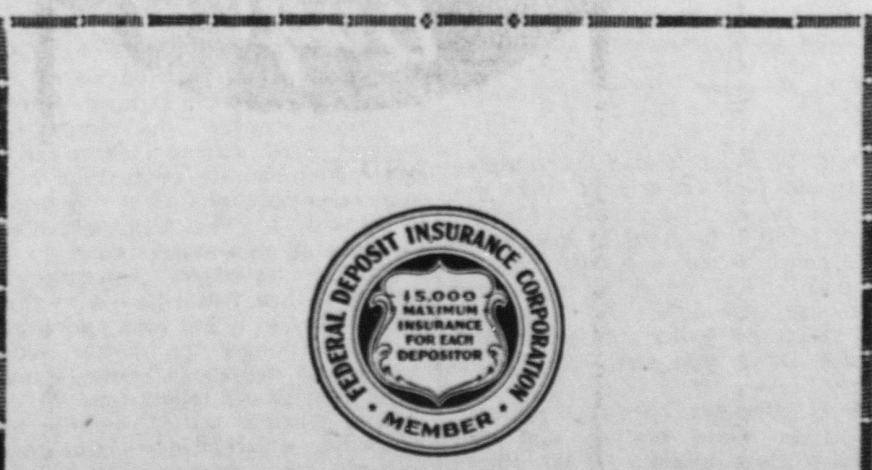
