Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby, proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—

That article fourteen be amended by adding thereto section eight as follows:—Section 8. The County of Philadelphia as a municipal corporation separate and Section 8. The County of Philadelphia as a municipal corporation separate and distinct from the City of Philadelphia is hereby abolished. Functions of county government within the city and functions of the Philadelphia courts shall be performed by officers of the city who shall be appointed or elected, as may be provided by law; but nothing in this section applies to the manner of selecting judges and magistrates. Except as the General Assembly may otherwise provide the tax-levying body of the city shall control all expenditures from the city treasury. Laws shall be enacted to provide that all appointments and promovide that all appointments and promovides. treasury. Laws shall be enacted to provide that all appointments and promotions of officers and employes, pald out of the city treasury, shall be according to merit and fitness. No officer or employe, whose compensation of the requirements of whose office are met in whole or in part from the city treasury, shall receive for his own use any fees or commissions for any work done in the course of his employment by any public agency, and all such fees or commissions received shall be paid into the city treasury for the use of the city. No law regulating the affairs of cities or counties shall be held invalid as local or special because of the inclusion of provisions giving effect to this section.

Section 2. That no inconvenience may arise from the changes in the Constitution of the Commonwealth and in order to carry the same into complete operation, it is hereby declared that—
