Items of news which interested those of a generation ago, taken from the files of The Reporter, year 1907.

October 31, 1907—

An effort is being made to formulate a course of study in the Centre Hall high school that will meet the approval of the State Superintendent of Instruction N. C. Shaffer, and place the school in line for extra appropriation from the state.

The corner stone of the United Evangelical church in Centre Hall was laid with appropriate services, Sunday morning. The ceremony was performed by Rev. H. T. Searle of Plattsfield and the pastor, Rev. J. R. Sechrist. It was in 1873, August 17, that the corner stone of the old church was laid.

At the close of 1907, at the present rate of shipping, Messrs. Foreman and Smith of Centre Hall expect to reach the 225th carload of hay.
