8,450 PERSONS AFFLICTED WITH INFANTILE PARALYSIS

The Public Health Service announces that infantile paralysis afflicted 8,460 persons in the United States from January 1 to October 16—a figure exceeded only by the 9,296 cases in 1935 and 13,500 in 1931.

The seasonal decline was less than usual this fall, the service said. During the last four weeks 2,615 cases were reported, more than twice the number in the same period a year ago.

November 7, 1907—

At Tuesday's election, Runkle, Democrat, defeated Chambers, Republican, for district attorney of Centre county, by a majority of 885. Kimpfort, Democrat, defeated Schenck, Republican, for prothonotary by a majority of 1030. Wetzel, Democrat, defeated Pletcher, Republican, for county surveyor by a majority of 96.
