Gregg Vocational Tops Manchester to Gain Semi-Finals—A goal in the third extra-period earned Spring Mills the right to play in the semi-finals of the Central Penna. Interscholastic Soccer League championship as the Gregg Township booters edged out Manchester, York county titleholders, 2-1, in a quarter-final encounter on New Beaver Field on Friday.

Spring Mills champions of the Centre County Soccer League, will battle Troy, Tioga county leaders, in an attempt to reach the final round and the crown-deciding game with McAllisterville, Mifflin-Juniata county victors.

Spring Mills and Manchester battled through four regular quarters and then four extra-periods in order to complete the elimination tournament. The teams fought on even terms throughout with the advantage going back and forth.

It was Fred Feltenberger, whose kick in the third extra-period, ended the struggle. Midway in the session Feltenberger dribbled up the field and booted a terrific drive at the Manchester goal tender. The ball bounded back to the playing field and Feltenberger followed quickly and boomed the ball squarely between the up-rights.

Feltenberger was partially responsible for the first Gregg Township goal, scored in the first period of the game. Feltenberger passed to Spayd, Spring Mills center forward, who tallied to give the eventual winners the lead.

Although every player in the contest deserved praise, Rossman, Spring Mills' midget right halfback, appeared to be the outstanding man on the field. His kicking was accurate with either foot and he stomped Manchester drives repeatedly.
