#### SPRING MILLS WINS SOCCER CROWN IN CENTRAL PENNA.

Gregg Township Vocational School won the Central Pennsylvania Soccer championship by defeating McAllisterville in a 1-0 game on New Beaver Field, State College, on Friday.

Spring Mills gained the final round by defeating Manchester, York county champions, and Troy, Tioga county leaders. McAllisterville eliminated Orangeville and Lewisburg. Spring Mills won the eastern division title of the Centre County League and then turned back Hubbersburg for the league crown. McAllisterville held the Juniata-Mifflin title.

Marshal Frazier registered the winning point in the contest with McAllisterville, in the third quarter. This goal by Spring Mills appeared to demoralize the opponents, yet close to the finish McAllisterville made daring drives, but like in previous quarters the shots were wide.

In the third and fourth quarters the Spring Mills team made the majority of attacks. On two occasions Fred Feltenberger made two misadventures in his booting for the McAllisterville goal.

Spring Mills was presented with Bill Jeffrey's trophy by Dr. Elwood C. Davis of the school of physical education and athletics of the College. Dr. Davis congratulated the winners for returning the honor to Centre county and lauded their play in the final game.

Previous winners of the Central Pennsylvania title are: 1930, Boalsburg; 1931, Middleburg; 1932, Middleburg; 1933, Centre Hall; 1934, Rebersburg; 1935, Catawissa; 1936, Lewisburg and Mansfield.

**SPRING MILLS VOCATIONAL ON Way to Win C. P. I. Soccer Championship**—Centre county won a place in the Central Pennsylvania Interscholastic Soccer championship on Tuesday of last week as Spring Mills Centre county titleholders, turned back Troy, Tioga county leaders, 4-1 in a semi-final game on New Beaver Field, State College.

With this victory, the Gregg Township eleven earned the right to meet McAllisterville in the finals for the trophy donated by Penn State's soccer coach, Bill Jeffrey. McAllisterville is champion of the Mifflin-Juniata counties circuit and entered the final round by defeating Lewisburg last week.

One minute after the game opened Spring Mills was off to a lead over Troy which Coach John Decker's lads held to the end. Spayd, diminutive center forward, took a pass from Rossman, dribbled through the Troy defense and booted the ball into the corner of the goal. The ball hit the inside of the post and was declared good.

Just before the first quarter ended Spring Mills had another goal. The ball bounded from a melee of players in front of the Troy net and Rossman, who sparkled throughout the game, arched a long shot which dropped into pay dirt just over the heads of a crowd of defenders.

Fred Feltenberger, Gregg's outside left, registered two goals in the 4th quarter to clinch the victory. Both times, Feltenberger, whose goal in the third extra period defeated Manchester a week previous, dribbled through the Troy defense to tally.
