SPRING MILLS WINS SOCCEB CROWN IN CENTRAL PENNA .--Gregg Township Vocational School won the Central Pennsylvania Soccer championship by defeating McAllisterville in a 1-0 game on New Beaver

Field, State College, on Friday. Spring Mills gained the final round by defeating Manchester, York county champions, and Troy, Tioga county leaders. McAlisterville eliminated Orangeville and Lewisburg. Spring Mills won the eastern division title of the Centre County League and then turned back Hubblersburg for the league crown. McAlisterville held the Juniata-Mifflin title.

Marshal Frazier registered the win ning point in the contest with Mc-Alisterville, in the third quarter. This goal by Spring Mills appeared to demoralize the opponents, yet close to the finish McAlisterville made daring drives, but like in previous quarters the shots were wide.

In the third and fourth quarters the Spring Mills team made the majority of attacks. On two eccasions Fred Feltenberg made two miscalculations in his booting for the MoAlisterville goal.

Spring Mills was presented with Bill Jeffrey's trophy by Dr. Elwood C. Davis of the school of physical education and athletics of the College. Dr. Davis congratulated the winners for returning the honor to Centre county and lauded their play in the final game.

Fred Feltenberger, Gregg's outside left, registered two goals in the 4th quarter to clinch the victory.
