HUNTERS' REPORT ON KILL OF GAME NOW COMPULSORY

Hunters are reminded by state game officials to send their reports of game killed in before Jan. 15, or else forfeit the \$2 penalty prescribed for such negligence under the new Game Code.

The penalty for failure to return these game kill reports was formerly \$20, but the provision was not enforced. The recent legislature reduced the fine, and this year it will be enforced, commission officials said. This is the only means whereby an accurate check on the annual game take can be made. Immediate mailing of these reports is suggested.

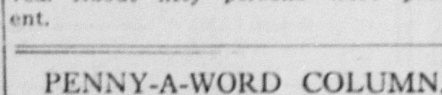

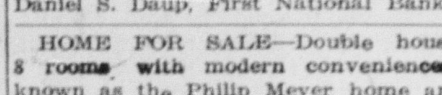
