Henry Klinefelter, son of Fred Klinefelter, of Potter township, killed a four-point buck while hunting in Sugar Valley one day last week. It was the young man's first experience as a deer slayer.

The Athletic Association of the Pennsylvania State College provided for a memorial to Charles Lee, Lock Haven, struck by lightning and killed May 30, 1933, while playing baseball during his freshman year at Penn State. The memorial is in the form of a professional cross.

Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Auman and daughter Betty, long-time residents of Spring Mills, next week, following their sale on Dec. 15, will remove to Mifflinburg, where Mr. Auman will be closer to his work as foreman on the L. & T. railroad section, extending westward from Montandon.

On Friday, December 17, the Centre Hall-Potter high school basketball teams will play their first games with East Penns Valley high teams on the home floor. In the season ticket sale which started Wednesday adult tickets are offered for one dollar; high school pupils' tickets, 75c; and grade tickets, 50 cents.

On Monday Ralph Luse received a puncture in the side of the heel of his left foot when a fork he carried on his shoulder fell to the ground the injury appeared slight, but by night the wound was given an electric baking by a Lewistown physician. Mr. Luse had a pronounced limp during the beginning of the week.

CCC camps in Pennsylvania to be closed December 31st, include those located at Sigel Benton, Jefferson county; North Bend, Clinton county; Shickville, Westmoreland county; Farmington, Fayette county; and Somerset, Somerset county. Throughout the United States the number of camps to be closed are 164.

A new Plymouth coupe was purchased by Russell Walker, an employe on the State highway, from "Jack" Smith, the veteran State College salesman. Mr. Walker had had luck on Friday. When crossing Nittany Mountain the Dodge sedan he operated skidded into the rocks. The damaged car was included in the deal for the new Plymouth.

Cutting ice is in progress on some streams, small dams and ponds, in the county during this week. In some localities the ice has a thickness of as much as nine inches. Since milk stations furnish ice daily to customers through their regular roulemen the practice of filling ice houses is not followed as generally as heretofore.

Making test hatches at the Kerlin Poultry Farm, Centre Hall, was begun on Monday, at which time 12,000 eggs were "set" in incubators heated and regulated during the week previous. The testing will continue for about a month and then "setting" in the half-million capacity incubators will begin on a large scale. With grain feeds at prices predicted throughout the season, poultry for egg production has a much brighter outlook than during 1937. Another condition favoring the prospect for the '38 pullet is the fact that the number of hens in farmers' hands is less than the average during past years.

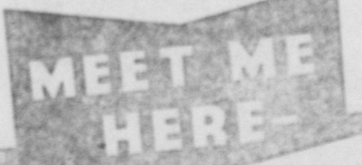

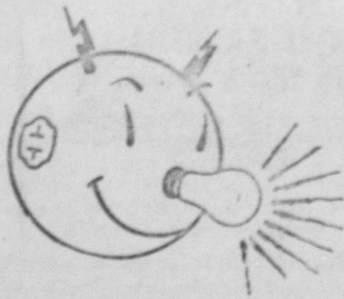
