Deaths

BOOZER.—After a prolonged illness Mrs. Martha J. Boozer died at her home in Centre Hall at 10:30 o'clock Sunday night. Since the middle of March she had been confined to bed, and for much of that time was entirely invalid. Before taking her bed she had hospital service. Death was due to complications.

Funeral services were held from the home and burial made in the family plot in the local cemetery Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. The officiating ministers were Rev. Ruple, of the Reformed church, Lewisburg, and Rev. J. M. Kirkpatrick, of the Centre Hall Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Boozer was the eldest of five daughters of Capt. G. M. and Sarah Ellen (Love) Boal, and was born in Harris township, on the former Shannon Boal farm, the family home of her father. Her marriage to David A. Boozer, whose death occurred about four years ago, took place in May of 1897. To this union there were born two sons, George B., deceased, and J. Shannon, of Centre Hall. There also survives a stepson, Ralph C. Boozer, of Chicago, Ill., and two stepdaughters, Mrs. Dr. Harry L. Kline, of Youngstown, Ohio, and Miss Edith Boozer. The surviving sisters are Mrs. C. W. Slack, Centre Hall; Mrs. (Dr.) W. E. Park, Ashville, N. C., and Mrs. W. Gross Mingle, Riverton, N. J.

Mrs. Boozer lived in Centre Hall during all of her life after her marriage. The age of the deceased was 71 years, 7 months and 19 days.

HERING.—Horace B. Hering, long a prominent figure in affairs in Gregg township, where he was born Feb. 24 1855, died Wednesday afternoon of last week as the result of the ravages of time. He was aged 82 years, 3 months and 21 days.

Deceased was a son of Samuel J. and Elizabeth Lohr Hering, and spent practically all his life in Gregg township. He was a skilled surveyor and during his early activities in his line of work was frequently called on to survey lands, the boundary lines of which were in dispute, disputes not all uncommon in that period. He also engaged as a lumberman and lastly in farming near Penn Hall, on the Hering homestead.

Two sons and two sisters survive the deceased as does also his widow formerly Miss Mary R. Swann. The

sons are Walter E. and Charles A. both at home. Mrs. Jennie Shook and Mrs. John F. Hosterman are the surviving sisters.

Funeral services were held at the Goodhart funeral parlor Friday afternoon, Rev. O. E. Feeman of the Lutheran church, officiating, and interment made in the Heckman cemetery, near where the deceased lived during most of his life.

HOOVER.—Alfred Hoover of Pleasant Gap died Wednesday night of last week from a heart condition, following a week's illness. He was born at Giltown and would have been 65 years old January 31.

The son of William and Mary Elizabeth Moyer, he married Viola Ripka who survives, nearly 40 years ago. The following children also survive: Mrs. Edith Spicer and Mrs. Arthur Shook of Bellefonte; Mrs. Henry Hinton of Howard, Emmeline and Vincent at home.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon from the late home with Rev. G. H. Gaunt officiating. Interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery at Pleasant Gap.

BOOP.—Harry Ervin Boop, 69, died at his home at Loganton, Sunday evening at 5:30 of complications which followed a paralytic stroke suffered two weeks ago. He was a native of Centre county and was a butcher for many years, later conducting a general store at Loganton. He retired after the big fire at Loganton 19 years ago, in which his store was one of the properties destroyed.

Surviving are his wife, Della; a daughter, Mrs. Tenna Thompson and a foster son, Harry Marks, at home; and the following brothers and sisters: Elmer and Mrs. J. H. Crouse, both of Aaronsburg; Newton, 65 Bellevue, O.; Clarence, of Millheim; Mrs. Orrie Shaw, of Millheim; Gurney, of Spring Mills.

Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) forenoon, and interment made at Loganton.

LONG.—Wm. Henry Long, Penn township resident, passed away at his home near Coburn Monday morning of last week, following a prolonged illness of dropsy and heart trouble.

Funeral services were held Wednesday of last week at the late home of the deceased, the Rev. G. A. Probst officiating. Interment was made in the Aaronsburg Reformed cemetery. He was aged 80 years, 3 months and 12 days.

He followed farming all his life in the neighborhood where he was born

and reared. He was never married. Surviving is a sister Mrs. Ezra Keen of Millheim.

CAMPBELL.—John Bailey Campbell died on Sunday at his home in Tyrone, aged 69 years. He is survived by a wife and three children. He was a brother of the late R. P. Campbell Penna Cave.
