Service Charges

CHECKING ACCOUNTS

On accounts where the average balance in any one month falls below \$50.00, a minimum charge of 50c will be made.

"Not Sufficient Funds,"—a charge of not less than 25c shall be made of each check drawn against an account when funds are not available, including postdated checks.

OVERDRAFTS

Oyerdrafts will not be allowed. Should overdrafts occur, not less than 25c per item shall be charged.

CASHIER'S CHECKS AND DRAFTS

A charge of 10c per item shall be made for each cashier's check or draft.

CASHING OUT-OF-TOWN CHECKS

The following charges will be made: 10c on amounts up to \$50.00; 15c, \$50.00 to \$100.00; 25c, \$100.00 to \$250.00; and 1-10th of 1% on amounts of \$250.00 or more.

These charges apply to NON-Customers and to Customers whose accounts are on the service charge basis.

CHE-K BOOKS

A reasonable charge will be made for check books. There shall be a charge of 50c for all checking and savings accounts that are CLOSED within 60 days after opening.

NOTES

A minimum charge of 50c on all loans, regardless of size, shall be made.

STOCKS AND BONDS

A service charge of not less than \$1.00 shall be made on stocks and bonds, sold, purchased, redeemed, deposited, exchanged, or transferred.

SIGHT DRAFTS AND COLLECTION ITEMS

A minimum charge of 25c per item up to the amount of \$250.00 shall be made. On amounts over \$250.00 a charge of 1-10th of 1% shall be made.
