INGERY IN FAVOR OF UNIVERSAL SERVICE ACT

Congressman Don Ginery is in favor of H. R. 6704, a Bill to prevent profiteering in time of war, and to equalize the burdens of war. Under the provisions of this Bill the President would be authorized to regulate uniform prices, exercise Government control over material resources and industries, and require the registration of any or all individuals in the management or control of any industrial establishment designated by him. Individuals so registered may be required to enter into the service of the Government as civilians for the duration of the war, under rules and regulations prescribed by the President.

During a war there shall be in effect a system of taxation allowing a fair normal return to labor, management and invested capital, this return to be fixed by Congress, all profits above such return to be absorbed by the Government.

This Bill has the unanimous support of the American Legion.

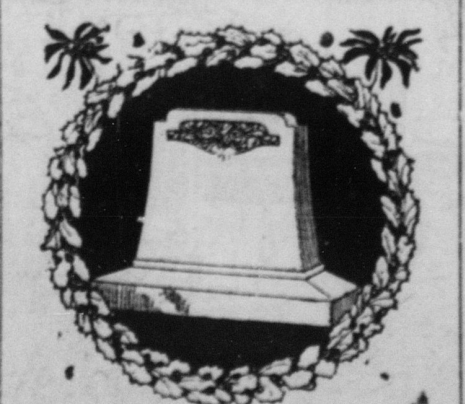
