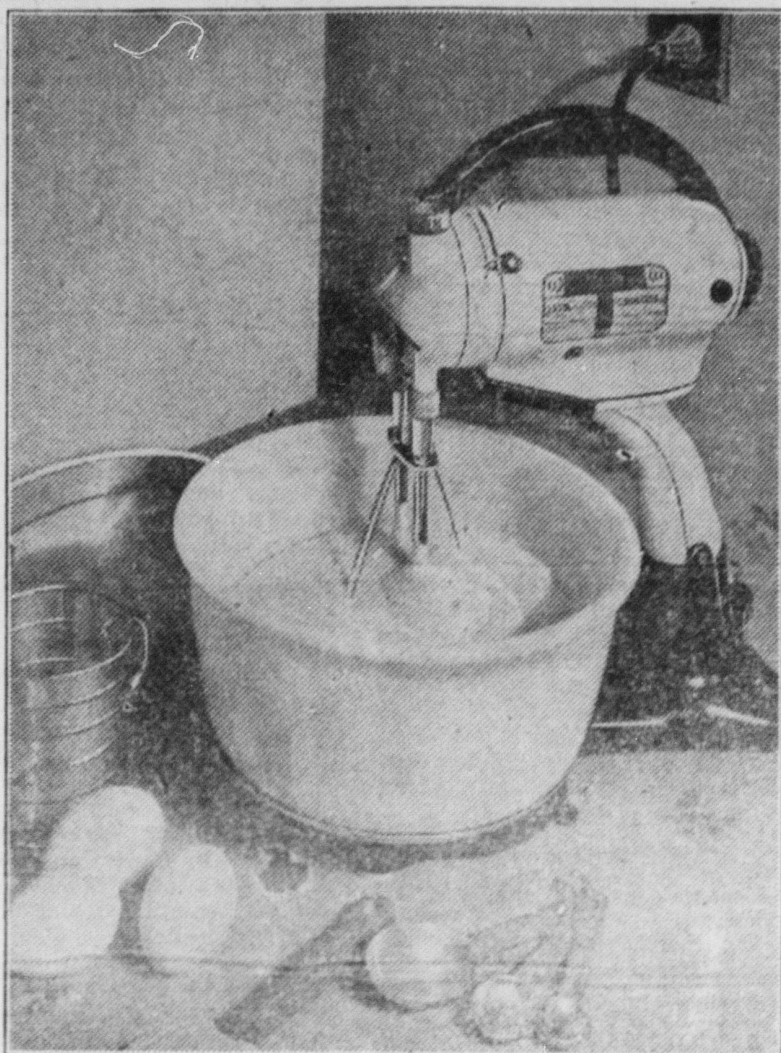
The M. E. church at Spruceport has been remodeled on the interior. A new altar rail and pulpit platform have been constructed.

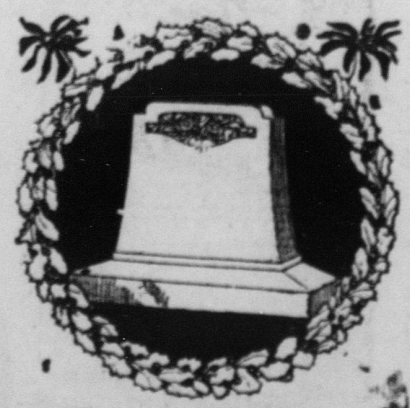

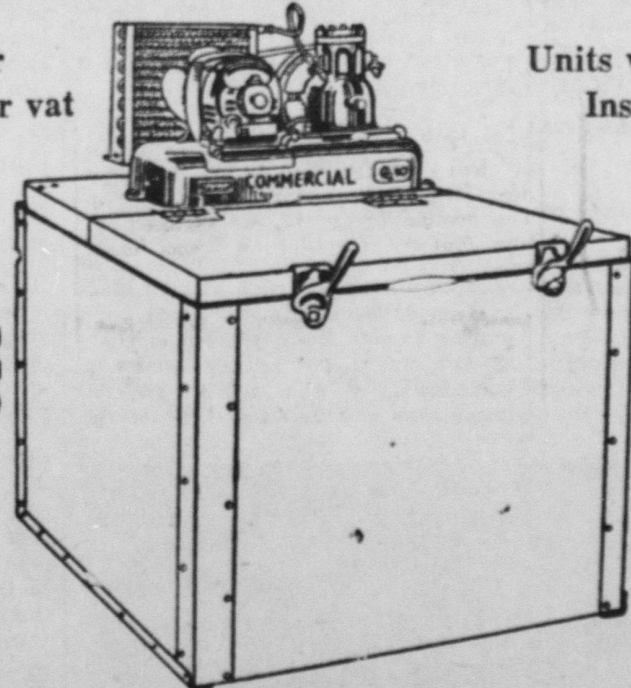
