TEN YEARS FOR BEATING AGED MOTHER TO DEATH

John W. Myers, 42, was sentenced on Monday to 10 to 20 years in the Western Penitentiary for beating his mother to death because she refused him money to buy liquor. Myers pleaded guilty and the court took testimony to fix the penalty. The mother, Hannah J. Myers, 74, was slain last November 3. Myers beat her with his fists when she refused to give him money.

Joan, young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John B. Wert, Jr., who is suffering from swollen glands at the neck, continues to be bedfast but is making recovery. Her temperature is much reduced and general condition improved according to a statement of the family physician.

Brothers and sisters surviving are Dr. Henry F. Bitner, Rochester, N. Y.; Daniel N. Bitner, Hastings, Nebraska; James C. Bitner, Hastings, Neb.; R. Ursinus Bitner, Avis; Mrs. George H. Long, Newark, Ohio. Surviving also are seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

She was a member of the Reformed church for seventy-five years. Her pastor, Rev. G. A. Fred Griesling, will conduct the funeral services at 10:00 a. m., Friday. Burial will be made in the Salem Reformed cemetery near the home.

GEARY.—Mrs. Ellen Geary, one of the most elderly ladies in lower Penna Valley, died on Monday evening at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Ollie Auman, in Millheim, where she had lived during the past ten years. Death was due to the exhaustion of the physical body. She suffered no pains or distress.

Mrs. Geary, whose maiden name was Ellen Hull, was born in Aaronsburg, and had attained her eighty-fifth year on September 14, last. She was the widow of David L. Geary, whose death occurred about fifteen years ago.

CRAMER.—Benjamin F. Cramer died at his home near Tusseyville, in Potter township, Saturday evening, from myocardial failure, at the advanced age of almost 84 years. He was born in Ferguson township, February 24, 1855, making his age at death 83 years, 11 months, 25 days.

Deceased was the eldest of twelve children born to John and Christine (Custoborder) Cramer. He was a retired farmer. He is survived by a wife, formerly Sadie Dietzel, reared where Mr. Cramer died, and three sons—William, Charles and Elmer, all living in Altoona; also by two stepchildren—Mrs. Charles Wolf and Dewey Neff, of State College. WOODRING.—S. Kilne Woodring, prominent Bellefonte justice of the peace for the past 15 years and former lawyer, passed away at his home shortly after 11 o'clock last Thursday morning. He had taken a walk and became ill after he returned to his home. He was 65 years old and death was attributed to complications.

Born in Bellefonte, Mr. Woodring was the son of Sheriff Daniel W. and Mary Hazy Woodring, both deceased. His wife, the former Mary Cruse, survives with one daughter, Mrs. A. I. Tob, of Beaver. Robert H. Woodring of Bellefonte is a surviving brother and Mrs. Wm. T. Hunt, Sr., of Lock Haven, and Mrs. Roy Coorsman of Altoona are surviving sisters.

Mr. Woodring attended Penn State during 1891 and '92 and later studied law under the late David Fortney of Bellefonte. He was a member of the bar. With falling eyesight about 15 years ago, Mr. Woodring became justice of the peace in the north ward of Bellefonte and until a short time ago attended to his duties quite regularly. He was a member of the Presbyterian church.

HOFFMAN.—John H. Hoffman, a former owner of the Millheim hosiery mill, died in Millheim, aged 92 years. He came to Millheim from Shamokin about 1906 and after conducting his mill for twenty years retired to private life. He was a Civil War veteran, enlisting at the age of 17 years.

Deceased was born in Berryburg. His wife, formerly Mary Ann Swalek is deceased, but there survive him two daughters and a son—Mrs. Will D. Moyer, Harrisburg; Mrs. Frank F. Coover, New Cumberland, and Commander J. H. Hoffman, U. S. N., Germantown. George Hoffman, of Sunbury, is a brother, and Mrs. Adaline Koser is a sister of the deceased.

Funeral services were held Thursday morning, Rev. Seth Russell officiating. The body was taken to Williamstown, Dauphin county, where interment was made on Friday.

DANNLEY.—Funeral services were held Sunday for Mordecai Dannley, 88, at his home in Seville. Mr. Dannley died Friday from complications incident to old age. He was a native of Pine Grove Mills.
