Andrew Curtin Thompson, father of State Senator Edward J. Thompson, of Philipsburg, pneumonia. Mr. Thompson had been in ill health for the past several years suffering from a heart condition, Later pneumonia developed, resulting in his death.

Mr. Thompson was the son of Andrew Jackson and Mary Hartsock Thompson and was born at Stormstown on Sept. 8th, 1860, making his age 77 years, 6 months and 1 day. Following his graduation from Pine Grove Mills Academy he began his teaching career in the State of Kansas and in 1893 he went to Philipsburg where he was employed as a teacher in North Philipsburg schools.

He later became principal of the Snow Shoe schools where he remained for several years. Giving up teaching, Mr. Thompson entered the hardware business and for 30 years was a traveling representative of the Potter-Hoy Hardware company, of Bellefonte, and other firms, retiring at 71

He was prominently connected with Sunday school and church work and was an unsuccessful Democratic candidate for the legislature.

On August 22, 1899, he was united n marriage to Miss Bertha Ellen Denning, of Philipsburg, his wife preeding him to the grave exactly 10 years to the day of Mr. Thompson's death. One son, Senator Edward J. Thompson, with whom he made his home, survives with one brother, M. J. Thompson, of Rising Sun, Md., and one sister Mrs. Alice Harshbarger, of Claysburg. Two grandchildren, Bertha Thompson and Edward J. Thompson, Jr., also survive.

Funeral services were held from Senator Thompson's home Friday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, in charge of the Rev. George F. Womer, of Philipsburg, assisted by the Rev. H. Willis Hartsock, pastor of the Bellefonte Methodist church. Interment was made in the Philipsburg cemetery.
