Deaths

THOMPSON.—Andrew Curtin Thompson, father of State Senator Edward J. Thompson, of Phillipsburg, died at his son's home in Phillipsburg, Wednesday morning of last week of pneumonia. Mr. Thompson had been in ill health for the past several years suffering from a heart condition. Later pneumonia developed, resulting in his death.

Mr. Thompson was the son of Andrew Jackson and Mary Hartsock Thompson and was born at Stormstown on Sept. 8th, 1860, making his age 77 years, 6 months and 1 day.

Following his graduation from Pine Grove Mills Academy he began his teaching career in the State of Kansas and in 1893 he went to Phillipsburg where he was employed as a teacher in North Phillipsburg schools.

He later became principal of the Snow Shoe schools where he remained for several years. Giving up teaching, Mr. Thompson entered the hardware business, and for 30 years was a traveling representative of the Potter-Hoy Hardware company, of Bellefonte, and other firms, retiring at 71 years.

He was prominently connected with Sunday school and church work and was an unsuccessful Democratic candidate for the legislature.

On August 22, 1899, he was united in marriage to Miss Bertha Ellen Denning, of Phillipsburg, his wife preceding him to the grave exactly 10 years to the day of Mr. Thompson's death. One son, Senator Edward J. Thompson, with whom he made his home, survives with one brother, M. J. Thompson, of Rising Sun, Md., and one sister, Mrs. Alice Harshbarger, of Claysburg. Two grandchildren, Bertha Thompson and Edward J. Thompson, Jr., also survive.

Funeral services were held from Senator Thompson's home Friday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, in charge of the Rev. George F. Womer, of Phillipsburg, assisted by the Rev. H. Willis Hartsock, pastor of the Bellefonte Methodist church. Interment was made in the Phillipsburg cemetery.

JORDAN.—William Abraham Jordan, born and living in Potter township all of his life, died on Wednesday morning of last week after an illness of several years, from a heart condition, the last few weeks of which he was confined to bed. He was a farmer by occupation, but retired a few years ago, and at his death lived a short distance south of Colyer.

He was a son of Andrew and Liris Bubb Jordan, and was born January 14, 1867, making his age 71 years, one month and 25 days. There survive him a wife, formerly Ida Klinefelter, and an adopted daughter.

Funeral services were conducted at the home and church by Rev. D. R. Keener and burial made in the Tusseyville cemetery on Saturday morning. Also surviving are these brothers and sister: John, Greeley, Stewart, living in the vicinity of Colyer; Emmet, Reading, and Mrs. Benjamin Rickett, Woolrich.

COFFEY.—Mrs. Sarah E. Coffey died at the home of a daughter, Mrs. John W. Dague, in Kingswood, W. Va., on Saturday morning. She was aged 89 years and was born in Clinton county. Her maiden name was Sarah Martin. Her husband was Louis Coffey, now deceased.

Mrs. Coffey had lived in State College for twenty years and visited for long periods with a granddaughter, Mrs. Ray Noll, at Pleasant Gap.

There survive Mrs. Dague and Louis Coffey, a daughter and son, also a brother, Alexander Martin, in Lock Haven, and a sister, Mrs. Annie McGill, of Lockport. The body was interred at Lock Haven.

STINE.—Edwin W. Stine, native of Millheim, passed away at his home in Tyrone, from injuries suffered when he was struck by an automobile nearly three years ago. At that time he had a broken leg, many bruises, as well as shock and possible internal injuries.

Mr. Stine was a former assistant trainmaster of the Tyrone division of the P. R. R. He was the son of David C. and Elizabeth (Wagner) Stine and was born in Millheim March 3, 1860. In 1874, he entered the employ of the railroad company as a messenger boy. Step by step he forged forward until he became prominent in Tyrone railroad circles, as well as in the community.

The deceased was a brother of the wife of Harry W. Dinges, also deceased, and frequently visited here.

Burial was made on Saturday at Unionville.

Mr. Butts for many years made his home with Mrs. Amanda Miller, Bellefonte. He was about 70 years of age. Burial was made in Holyoke, Mass., Wednesday of last week.

ROWAN.—Mrs. Caroline Alexander Rowan, formerly a resident of Unionville, died on Monday afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Charles E. Schaeffer, Bellefonte, where she had made her home for the past month. She was in her early 70's.

Her husband, Alexander Rowan, died in 1934. Surviving are three children. Funeral services will be held in the Unionville Presbyterian church this (Thursday) afternoon, with the Rev. Howard E. Oakwood of Milesburg, officiating. Burial will be made in the new cemetery at Unionville.
