SCHOOL CHILDREN TO COMPETE IN AIR MAIL WEEK POSTER

Somewhere in the United States are two school children who will attain nation-wide fame, as artists for their assistance in promoting National Air Mail Week which will begin May 15. The National Air Mail Week Committee arranged a poster contest for the boys and girls in high schools and grammar schools and institutions having similar courses of study, according to an announcement by Joseph F. Gallagher, postmaster, of Philadelphia and chairman of the central committee directing Air Mail Week preparations in this State. This contest will close the last day of this month and few days thereafter the winner in each of the 48 states will be announced. The State chairman declares that any pupil in grammar or high school classes may compete. He explained that the poster, to be eligible, must relate to the country's air mail service of the present and future and its adaptability to the needs of the nation. That allows the contestant a broad opportunity to use their imagination and to demonstrate their artistic talents. Posters will be judged 50 per cent. for neatness and 25 per cent. for adaptability to promotion of the air mail service's further development. The poster should be on cardboard twenty by twenty-five inches. Further information by prospective contestants may be had from the principal of your high school.

3,500 CIVIL SERVICE APPOINTEES TO BE NAMED

Secretary of Labor and Industry Ralph M. Boshore disclosed on Friday that between 650 and 700 civil service appointees in the Unemployment Compensation Division would be named by April 20.

Boshore has named 50 appointees to clerical and messenger jobs, and said an additional 50 probably would be appointed soon.

The new appointees replace those hired by the State Employment Service and Unemployment Compensation Division prior to January 1.

Boshore asserted that ultimately, in the civil service reorganization, the joint services 3,500 permanent employes would be named. "All civil service appointments in the Unemployment Compensation Division," said Boshore, "have been made on lists certified to me by the State Board of Review."

The Post Office Department will celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the regular air mail service by observing the first National Air Mail Week from May 14 to May 21. The Boalsburg office plans to have its own cachet and it is hoped that all patrons of the office will prove the worth of this valuable service by mailing at least one article via AIR-MAIL during this period.

At an impressive confirmation service in the Lutheran church on Palm Sunday evening a class of nine young ladies and three young men was received into church membership by transfer. Services will be held Wednesday and Friday evenings of this week. Sunrise service on Easter morning at 6:30; S. S. at 9:30; and Communion service at 10:30.

Chevrolet dealers sold 62,639 new cars and trucks in March, a 57.2 per cent. increase over the sales total for February. During the final ten days in March 27,506 new cars and trucks were sold, indicating a firmer market. The March used car sales totaled 130,788 against 116,915 sold in February. This was the 37th consecutive month that Chevrolet dealers sold in excess of 100,000 used cars, and gave them a grand total of used car sales during the last 37 months of 5,630,886.

COUNTY INSTITUTIONAL DISTRICT BUDGET AVAILABLE

The Centre County Institutional District budget which will be adopted April 28, is now available for inspection at the County Commissioners' office in the Court House.

The total anticipated revenue of the Institution District is \$52,219, while the total estimated expenditures amount to \$89,550. Both of these figures should be \$35,000 less than they really are for the following reason:

The County Institutional District had no funds when it started functioning and was compelled to borrow up to \$35,000 in temporary loans to set the district's machinery in operation. Under the law, however, the district is prohibited from making loans for a period longer than six months, the loans to be paid off within a year. Consequently the item of \$25,000 appears twice in the budget: once under "estimated receipts" and again under "extraordinary expenditures" since the loans must be retired within the budget year. Or, in other words, the actual governmental revenue is \$57,219 and the actual estimated governmental expenditures \$54,550.

The estimated receipts were anticipated through the following sources of current revenue: expenses of inmates paid by individuals, temporary loans, 5 mills real estate and occupations tax.

General administration expenses of the district are estimated at \$9860 for the following items: salaries or services of Commissioners clerk, investigators, tax collectors, solicitors, office supplies, advertising, traveling expenses, office equipment and expense of tax collection including expenses in Co. Treasurer's office.

The Institution District will continue operation of the Bellefonte and Rush township poor homes as county homes, the Spring township homes having been abandoned March 1. The total cost of maintaining these two homes is estimated at \$6250, including administration expense, care of inmates and operation of homes and rentals.

For maintenance of dependents in institutions not operated by the County District the estimated cost is \$22,660. This figure includes the cost of mental patients in state hospitals, mental defectives in training schools, children in other institutions not included in the above, support of poor in other institutions and appropriations to institutions (Centre County Hospital).

Other forms of care to be provided by the Institution District will cost an estimated total of \$15,500. Food and provisions, fuel, clothing, and shoes, transportation for families or individuals, medical care, board for children and adults in private families, burial expense and cash for home relief are included in this figure.
