He explained that the poster, to be eligible, must relate to the country's air mail servadaptibility to the needs of the nation. That allows the contestants a broad opportunity to use their imagination and to demonstrate their artistic talents.

Posters will be judged 50 per cent. for neatness and 25 per cent. for adaptability to promotion of the air mail service's further development. The poster should be on cardboard twenty by twenty-five inches.
