Warren Slack, sister Lizzie and Miss Geraldine Hoover spent Sunday at the home of Oscar Bierly, in Hubbersburg.

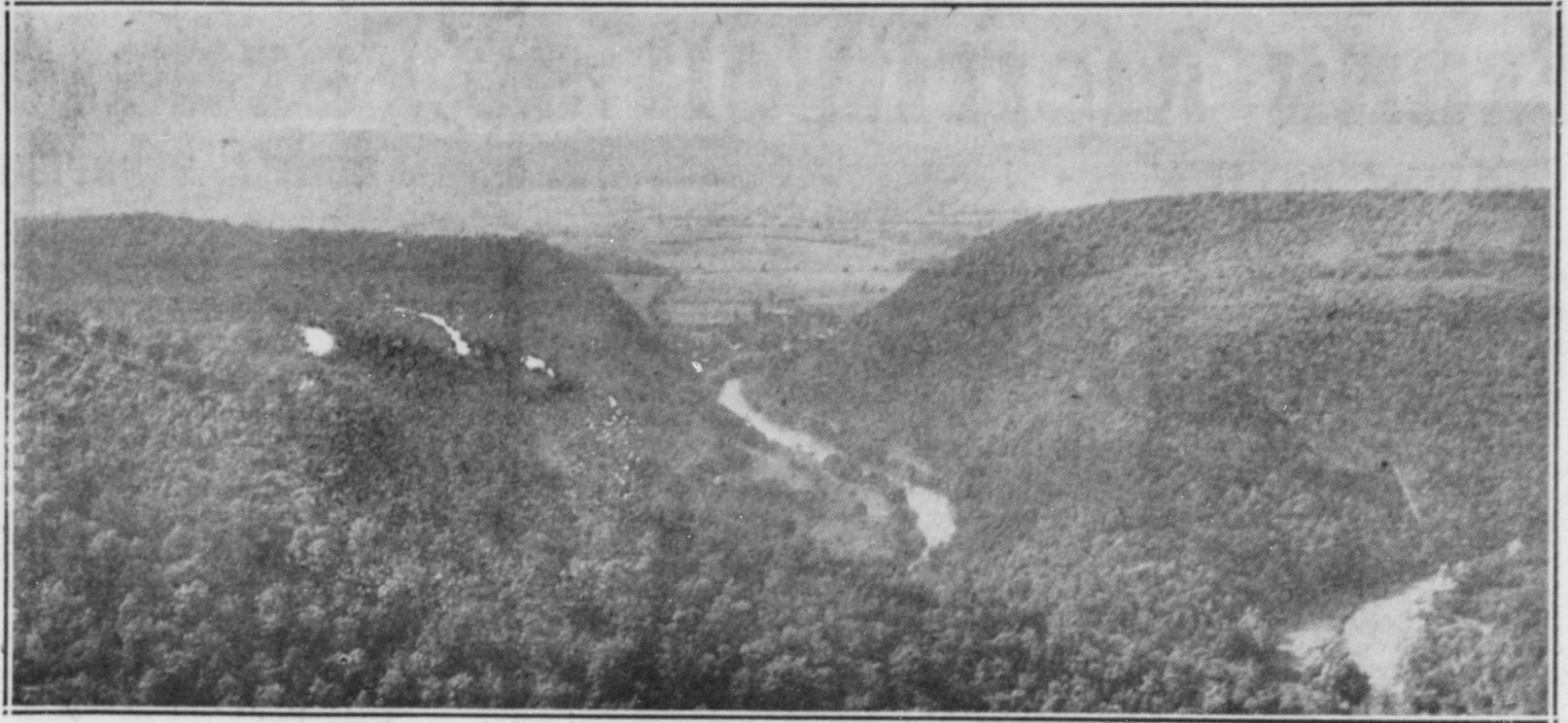

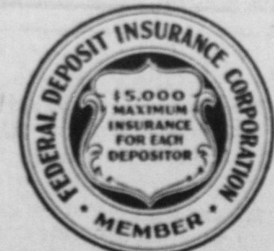
