### GINGERY ANNOUNCES COAST GUARD ACADEMY EXAM.

Congressman Don Gingery has been notified that the United States Coast Guard will hold a competitive examination on June 8, for appointment of Cadets to the Coast Guard Academy at New London, Conn. This examination is open to young men between the ages of 17 and 22 years.

The mental requirements in general are the same as those required for admission to an engineering college, the course of instruction embracing a period of four years, being basically scientific and engineering in character. After graduation a cadet is eligible for a commission in the Coast Guard as Ensign.

Those interested in taking this examination should communicate with the Commission, U. S. Coast Guard, Washington, D. C.
