BEN SHAW, RECORD HOLDER, TO ENTER ALTOONA SPEEDWAY EVENT, SATURDAY, JUNE 11

The name of the second world's automobile racing record holder to enter the Altoona Speedway's 100-mile national championship event June 11 was announced this week by W. A. Morgan, owner-manager of the rebuilt track.

He is Ben Shaw, Woodbury, N. J., daredevil who shattered the world's mark for 100 miles at Langshorne, Pa. last year and then set a new record over the flat half-mile distance at Honokus, N. J. Shaw last season competed in A. A. A. sanctioned contests.

The world's record for the half mile on a banked track is held by Everett Saylor, Dayton, Ohio, who was one of the first to file his entry for the Altoona event, Saylor roared around the Winchester, Ind., half mile oval in 22 seconds flat.

Selection of George Heller, Dayton, O., as the official starter for the June 11 championship classic was announced by Morgan and met the approval of the Central States Racing Association Contest Board. Heller, a veteran of many years' experience in supervising championship automobile speed tests, has a wide following among racing fans.

When Heller flashes the green starting flag 23 drivers, selected because they turned in the fastest times during a three-day qualifying program

starting June 8, will whip their machines across the starting line in a battle of speed, skill and endurance with valuable cash awards and coveted championship points as the chief stakes.
