New Transparent Curtains

These dainty bedroom curtains are made of clear cellulose film printed to resemble white net with a green floral pattern. They stay fresh and clean, and are not affected by dampness.

THE NEW transparent curtains are both practical and sophisticated. Their variety of smart designs and colors makes them adaptable to many types of rooms—not only kitchens and bathrooms, but rumpus rooms, children's rooms, dining and living rooms.

The curtains come in several sizes, all ready to hang—the ones pictured are 29x41 inches. Others are 54x21 inches, and 75x21 inches. They are finished with a 9-inch valance at the top and a heading secured with adhesive. Some have hemmed edges, others are simply cut off, as the material does not fray. This makes shortening an easy matter, since you only need to use a scissors on them—or a hem can be made by folding back the self-sealing film and pressing with a very hot iron.

Such curtains seem to be especially adaptable for summer use, since they stay crisp and fresh looking. They are not affected by dampness, so they won't be spoiled if a sudden shower comes up and you forget to close the window.

Kitchen steam or splashing from the bathroom shower won't hurt them, either. When they become soiled they may be wiped with a damp cloth.

If you like to make a few simple changes to your furnishings to give the rooms a cooler, more summery look, these transparent curtains might well replace the heavier winter ones. With the addition of some inexpensive summer lamp shades and a few light cushions, a room would quickly take on a pleasantly fresh appearance.

The clear bright colors used in the new patterns are charming—there's a feathery plume design in gold and white on rose or deep blue, and in gold and green on clear film; floral patterns in bright or pastel colors; a ribbon-tied bouquet motif of red and blue flowers that would be lovely in a summer bedroom. Another type of pattern has been cleverly printed so that it seems to be on a mesh weave.

Transparent film curtains are inexpensive and may be found in many home furnishing stores.
