THOMAS B. HAMILTON, 100 YEARS OLD, TO BE GUEST AT GETTYSBURG

Bellefonte's only remaining Civil War veteran, Thomas B. Hamilton, will attend the commemoration of the Battle of Gettysburg, June 29 to July 4. The Federal Government is entertaining veterans of North and South at Gettysburg in what will be an occasion of special historical interest to many residents of Central Pennsylvania.

For almost three years Centre Hall has been without a living Civil War veteran. The last local veteran, W. H. Bartholomew, passed away two years ago last September.

The celebration at Gettysburg will bear witness to the thinning ranks of the soldiers who at one time marched by thousands to save the Union but are now numbered in tens instead of thousands.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 8-A.

TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF CENTRE HALL NO. 7-A, RELATIVE TO THE DATE OF NOTES TO BE ISSUED IN PURSUANCE THEREOF.

SECTION 1: Be it enacted and ordained by the Borough of Centre Hall that the second sentence of Section 2 of said Ordinance No. 7-A of said Borough be amended in part to read as follows: "Said notes shall bear date, May 15, 1938, bear interest from the date thereof, as follows," etc.

SECTION 2: That the last paragraph of Section 4 of said ordinance be amended to read as follows: "In witness whereof the Borough of Centre Hall has caused this note to be executed by its president of the Borough Council and its corporate seal to be hereto affixed, duly attested by its Secretary as of the 15th day of May, 1938".

SECTION 3: It is hereby declared that the sole purpose of this amendment to Ordinance No. 7-A is to change the date of the notes to be issued thereunder.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances insofar as they are inconsistent herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

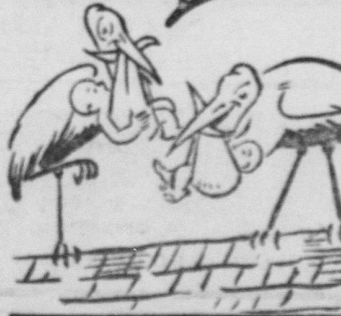
