Is your subscription due? DEATHS McCORMICK.—The very sudden death of J. Witte McCormick of Columbia, South Carolina, while en route to Tyrone, Friday morning, 8th inst., was a shock to his wife and legion of friends in Columbia, Penns. Valley, the place of his birth, Tyrone, where he engaged in business before going south, and in many sections where he was previously known. Mr. and Mrs. McCormick were on their way to Tyrone to visit Mrs. McCormick's mother, Mrs. Eliza Meyer, and her brothers, John D. and C. H. Meyer. As the train was approaching Washington, D. C., Mrs. McCormick had gotten up and was preparing for breakfast. She went to her husband's apartment and was shocked to find that he had passed away suddenly in his sleep. J. Witte McCormick was a son of the late James H. and Isabel (Pollock) McCormick and was born on the Huston farm east of Centre Hall, November 8, 1863, making his age at death seventy-four years and nine months. On August 9, 1894, he was united in marriage with Miss Mame Meyer, who survives his passing along with two sisters, Miss Kate McCormick and Mrs. Cora McCormick Bartholomew, both of Flemington. The body was taken to Tyrone, to the Graham Funeral parlors where services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Joseph A. Speer, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, on Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock. He was laid to rest in the Centre Hall cemetery at 11:30 a. m., Rev. D. R. Keener, pastor of the Reformed church, officiating at the burial. The high esteem in which Mr. McCormick was held was evidenced in the scores of beautiful floral tributes and the same hour the services were held in Tyrone and Centre Hall, several hundred friends assembled in the McCormick Funeral Home at 1218 Hampton street, Columbia, and led by five ministers of the city, held beautiful memorial services. Mr. McCormick was an undertaker by profession, having entered the services of William R. Camp, who established a business in Centre Hall. Later he purchased the business from Mr. Camp, who located in Bellefonte. About 1899 Mr. McCormick sold his business in Centre Hall and located in Tyrone, and two years later opened business in Columbia, where he continued until his death. While in the southern city he was highly successful in the conduct of his profession, and was equally successful in making investments in real estate. Mr. McCormick was a man of high ideals and took an active part in the business life of Columbia. Modestly and actively he lived with a sincere ambition to make lives happier around him. Mrs. Martz, born in Potter township, a daughter of John and Elizabeth Carson Love, was 73 years and 19 days of age. Surviving her in addition to her husband, William S. Several grandchildren also survive. Mrs. Jennie Rubie of New Alexander and Miss Flora Love of Hollidaysburg are surviving sisters. She was a member of the Lutheran church of Tusseyville. Mrs. Martz lived in Potter township all of her married life and for the greater part of that time near where she died. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon following the death from the Union church at Tusseyville with the Rev. L. Arthur Wagner officiating. Burial was made in the cemetery adjoining the church. WAGNER.—Russell Edwin Wagner of near Spring Mills died at his home on the Schaeffer farm along Sinking Creek, east of Centre Hall, where he lived as a tenant, from complications following a year's illness.
