Deaths

LONG.—Jesse Long, one of the Long brothers, former owners of Penns Cave, and the Penns Cave farm, died at the home of a niece, Mrs. Bennage, close to noon on Friday.

Burial was made on Monday afternoon at Farmers Mills. The deceased was the son of George and Barbara Hoag Long, and was born in Snyder county, June 5, 1847, making his age at death ninety-one years, one month and twenty-four days. He was the last member of the Long family.

On the death of the elder Long, two sons, Jesse and Samuel, took over the Long farm and Penns Cave, and shortly thereafter erected the present Penns Cave House, as it was known then. The investment overburdened the brothers, who were obliged to sell their holdings at a sacrifice. The property changed hands twice at a handsome profit before it was purchased by the late R. P. Campbell.

During the time the Longs owned the well-known cavern it was a popular resort for local gatherings, but it was not until the introduction of the automobile that Penns Cave became a profitable institution, part of the success being of course, good business management.

The deceased is survived by a wife, formerly Carrie Mersinger.

HARSHBARGER.—Clyde William Harshbarger, son of James R. Harshbarger of Centre Hill, near here, died on Monday afternoon from intestinal flu following a two-day illness. He had been a resident of Altoona for the past several years, where he was employed by the Harshbarger Dairy Company.

Mr. Harshbarger was born in Potter township 39 years ago last March 24, a son of James R. and Emma Glasgow Harshbarger. In addition to his parents he is survived by one brother, Ralph, at home.

The body was brought to the Goodhart preparation room on Monday evening, and on Wednesday was taken to the parental home where services were held at 2:30 p. m. Burial was made at Houseville, Rev. Homer E. Gaunt officiating.

MUSSER.—George M. Musser, well known Penns Valley native, died on Monday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Roxy Wilbourne, in Beuna Vista, Va., from a heart attack. Mr. Musser was born in Gregg township 76 years ago, a son of David and Catharine Reasick Musser. His wife, the former, Rebecca Neese, died 12 years ago. Funeral services were held Wednesday from the Wilbourne home in Beuna Vista, Va.

EMENHIZER.—Paul Dale Emehizer, former resident of Houserville but more recently of Houseville, died in the Centre County hospital from a blood stream infection. He had been ill one week and was 47 years, 7 months and 4 days old at the time of his death.

Born in Benner township on December 23, 1891, he was the son of Wm. and Alice Dale Emehizer. He was twice married, the first union being with Edna Mae Ishler, who died in 1925. D. Kauffman officiating. Interment was made in the cemetery at Houseville.
