PROPOSED AMENDMENTS (Continued from inside page) further liability being imposed on such county, municipality or township with respect thereto. Where any county, municipality or township shall issue obligations to provide for any improvement as hereinbefore provided, it may also issue obligations to provide for the interest and sinking fund charges accruing thereon until said improvement shall have been completed and in operation for a period of one year, and in the case of obligations issued in accordance with clause (a) of this section, said county, municipality or township shall not be required by law to levy a tax to pay said interest

and sinking fund charges until after said properties shall have been operated by said county, municipality or township during said period of one year. Any county, municipality or township, other than Philadelphia, authorized by law to issue obligations, may incur indebtedness for any of the purposes in this amendment set forth in excess of seven per centum and not exceeding ten per centum of the assessed valuation of taxable property therein, if said increase of indebtedness shall have been assented to by three-fifths of the electors voting at a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law.
