RUSH TWP. OVERSEERS' SALARY CLAIM DENIED

The County Commissioners are ordered to employ the Poor Overseers of Rush township for the remainder of their unexpired terms in that office according to the terms of a decree filed a few days ago by Judge Ivan Walker in the case of Alban C. Dumbleton and Edward Vaughn, Overseers, vs. the Commissioners of Centre county.

The decision is not a complete victory for the Overseers, however, for the Court's opinion contends that Dumbleton failed to show that he is entitled to a salary of \$175 per year, and Vaughn \$150 per year for their services. The matter of payment for their work in liquidating the affairs of Rush township is apparently left in the hands of the Commissioners.

When the County Institution District was set up January 1 of this year, Poor Overseers were thrown out of work. The Rush township officials claimed the Act provided that they were to be given employment, by the District until their terms expired. This contention was upheld by the Court. However, their claims that Dumbleton should receive \$175 annually and Vaughn \$150 per year, were not upheld.

The decision in this case is expected to have far-reaching effect throughout the county in the administration of the Institution District until such time as the terms of elected Overseers of the Poor have expired.

The Centre Hall baseball team closed their schedule in the Tri-Valley League, Thursday evening, by defeating Lemont, 11 to 2 on the Lemont diamond. CCC CAMP TO BE BUILT ON CONSERVATION PLOT IN BALD EAGLE VALLEY

A permanent CCC camp is to be established back of the Robinson farm not far from Mt. Eagle, according to reports. As evidence that the reports are correct much of the lumber for the camp buildings is already on the ground.

It will be recalled that in November, 1932, the U. S. Department of Agriculture purchased a large tract of land between Curtin and Mt. Eagle from Major M. Laird Curtin for the purpose of establishing a soil conservation demonstration plant and tree nursery. Headquarters were established in the old James Curtin residence, at Curtin, in November, and a small force of men has been at work there ever since, under direction of Wade Evey of Pleasant Gap.

But the demonstrations planned, and the proposed nursery, have outgrown the present personnel, and a permanent CCC camp seemed the most satisfactory plan of securing sufficient help to carry on the work as outlined in the original plan.

The camp will probably be erected at once so as to have it in shape before cold weather sets in. It is understood that the federal government will purchase the land on which the camp will be located, which is taken as additional evidence that both the camp, the soil conservation work and the tree nursery will be permanent fixtures. The nursery, by the way, if carried out as originally planned, will be the largest in the United States, and will have an output of two million seedlings a year.

An irrigation plant will also be built, according to reports, the water to be pumped out of Bald Eagle creek.
