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FARM CALENDAR Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College Garden Program Planned — Garden Days at the Pennsylvania State College, October 5, 6 and 7, will include a program on growing and preparing flowers and plant materials, maintaining fertility in the flower garden, developing the home grounds, and pruning trees and shrubs.

Egg Auctions Thrive — Cooperative egg auctions in Pennsylvania did a \$2,500,000 business last year. Penn State agricultural economists report that the year's sales included 591,324 pounds of live poultry and 8,712,739 dozen eggs. The average sales per member exceeded \$812.

Fertilize Pastures—Spreading six to eight loads of manure per acre on pasture late in the fall will afford protection to the grasses and clovers and add humus and potash to the soil. Penn State agronomists say that cows will graze closely over the manured area next spring, which they will not do if the manure is applied then.

Feed Oats to Hens — Pale yellow yolks in eggs can be produced by feeding liberal quantities of oats to hens. Penn State poultrymen report that eggs properly handled from oiled layers usually appeal to the most critical buyers.

Careful Storage Needed—Blight-infected potatoes must be handled carefully. Penn State pathologists suggest putting the potatoes in temporary storage where they can dry thoroughly. After 10 days or two weeks they usually can be stored permanently.
