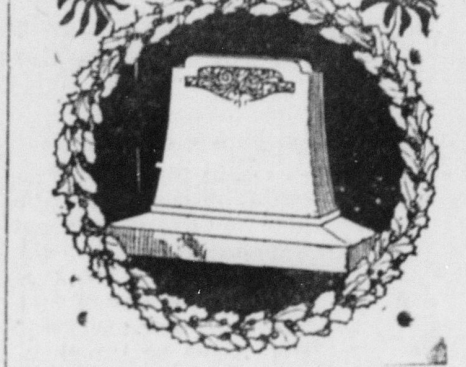

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION SUBMITTED TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH, FOR APPROVAL OR REJECTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON THE COMMONWEALTH DAY, PENNSYLVANIA AND PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH, IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

1935 SPECIAL SESSION

No. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to section one, article nine of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:— That article nine of the Constitution of Pennsylvania be amended to read as follows:—

Section 1. All officers and persons employed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth, or by or on behalf of any county, city, township or borough, shall be paid by salary or stated compensation. Such officers or persons shall not receive more than one salary, unless authorized by law. All fees, commissions, or salaries from whatever source received, shall be paid to the holder of the office or position by the County or City Treasurer, as may be provided by law. The provisions of this section shall not be construed to affect any salary or compensation of any officer or person in office on the date of the adoption of this amendment. The General Assembly shall provide by law for the strict accountability of all county, township and borough officers and persons in office on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and any moneys which may be paid to them.

the office of county commissioner shall be filled for the unexpired term by the court of common pleas of the county, by the appointment of an elector of the county who is a member of the same political party as was the party whose place is to be filled. In each county there shall also be elected a controller, a sheriff, and a district attorney. District attorneys, sheriffs and controllers shall hold their respective offices until their successors are duly elected and qualified. Vacancies in such offices shall be filled as may be provided by law. All other county officers shall be provided for by law.

The terms of elected county officers shall be four years, commencing on the first Monday of January next after their election.

Section 6. All officers and persons employed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth, or by or on behalf of any county, city, township or borough, shall be paid by salary or stated compensation. Such officers or persons shall not receive more than one salary, unless authorized by law. All fees, commissions, or salaries from whatever source received, shall be paid to the holder of the office or position by the County or City Treasurer, as may be provided by law. The provisions of this section shall not be construed to affect any salary or compensation of any officer or person in office on the date of the adoption of this amendment. The General Assembly shall provide by law for the strict accountability of all county, township and borough officers and persons in office on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and any moneys which may be paid to them.

No. 4-B

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to section one, article nine of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:— That article nine of the Constitution of Pennsylvania be amended to read as follows:—

Section 1. All property taxes shall be uniform upon the same class of subjects levied within the limits of the county. The General Assembly may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes, actual places of religious worship, places of burial not used or held for private or public profit, institutions of purely public character, and real estate owned by discharged soldiers, sailors and marines. Excise taxes shall be levied under general laws, but such laws may grant exemptions and provide for graded or graduated rates. Income taxes or taxes derived from which the income may be derived, and death duties including escheats shall be levied as follows:—

No. 5-B

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to section eight, article five of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:— That article five of the Constitution of Pennsylvania be amended to read as follows:—

Section 1. The term of office of any judge of the courts of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, respectively, shall, from the time of their election or appointment, and until the expiration of their term, be held for their terms of office, in such manner as may be directed by law: but the General Assembly may by separate courts of criminal jurisdiction in counties having the jurisdiction of courts of oyer and terminer and courts of quarter sessions of the peace.

No. 6-B

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to article nine, section eight of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:— That article nine, section eight, of the Constitution of Pennsylvania be amended to read as follows:—

Section 8. The debt of any city, borough, township, school district, or other municipality or incorporated district, except as provided herein and in section five of this article, shall never exceed seven (7) per centum upon the average assessed value of the taxable realty of the city or township, school district or other municipality or incorporated district as of the date of the last assessment preceding the time any debt is incurred or increased; and the debt of the City and County of Philadelphia shall never exceed fifteen (15) per centum upon the average annual assessed value of the taxable realty therein for the nine years immediately preceding the time any debt is incurred or increased; nor shall any county, city, borough, township, school district or other municipality or incorporated district incur any new debt or increase its debt to an amount exceeding ten (10) per centum upon such average annual assessed value of taxable realty as of the date of the last assessment preceding a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law.

In ascertaining the borrowing capacity of the City and County of Philadelphia at any time, there shall be deducted from such debt so much of the debt of the City and County as shall have been incurred or is about to be incurred and the proceeds thereof expended or to be expended upon any public improvement or in the construction, purchase or condemnation of any public utility or part thereof or facility or for, to the extent that such public improvement or public utility or part thereof or facility, when so expended or to be expended, is expected to yield revenue in excess of operating expenses sufficient to pay the interest and sinking fund charges thereon.

The method of determining such amount so to be deducted may be prescribed by the General Assembly. In incurring indebtedness for any purpose by the City and County of Philadelphia, its obligations, maturing not later than fifty (50) years from date thereof, with provisions for sinking funds, to retire said obligations at maturity, the payment to such sinking fund to be in equal or graded annual or other periodical installments. Where any indebtedness shall be or shall have been incurred by said City and County of Philadelphia for the purpose of the construction or improvement of public works or utilities of any character from which income or revenue is to be derived by said City and County or for the reclamation of land to be used in connection with wharves or docks owned or to be owned by said City and County, such obligations may be retired by bonds sufficient to provide for and may include the amount of the interest and sinking fund charges accruing and to be accrued thereon throughout the period of construction and until the expiration of one year after the completion of work for which said indebtedness shall have been incurred but not in excess of the time of the incurring of such indebtedness, and said City and

County shall not be required to levy a tax to pay said interest and sinking fund charges as required by Section ten, article nine of the Constitution of Pennsylvania until the expiration of said period of one year after the completion of said work.

Provided, however, that any city, county, borough, township, or other municipality after authorized district meetings and the consent of the electors thereof, increase its indebtedness to the extent of such work or construction, and beyond any limitation fixed herein, toward the sole purpose of constructing or completing sanitary treatment works.

No. 7-B

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to article nine of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by adding section eighteen.

Section 18. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:— That article nine of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be amended by adding thereto section eighteen to read as follows:—

Section 18. In addition to the purposes stated in article nine, section four of this Constitution, the State may be authorized to issue bonds to the amount of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) for the purpose of acquiring land for state forest purposes and for the development of the same.

No. 8-B

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to article nine, section fifteen, of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:— That article nine, section fifteen, of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be amended to read as follows:—

Section 15. No obligations which have heretofore been issued, or which hereafter be issued for the purpose of providing funds for the construction, acquisition, extension, enlargement, improvement of water works, subways, underground railways, street railways or bus lines, or the appointment of any officer, by any county, municipality or township other than Philadelphia, now or hereafter authorized by law, or obligations for such purposes, shall be considered a debt of such county, municipality or township within the meaning of section eight, article nine of the Constitution of Pennsylvania or of any amendments thereto.

(a) To the extent to be determined in such manner as may be provided by law that the revenue derived from said property or properties averaged over the period of five years immediately preceding the acquisition, extension, enlargement, and improvement of said property or properties, or for a period of five successive years subsequent to the construction, acquisition, extension, enlargement and improvement thereof, shall be sufficient to meet the interest and sinking fund charges on such obligations, such obligations shall be considered to have been provided for and no further liability shall be imposed on such county, municipality or township with respect thereto.

No obligations, which may hereafter be issued for the purpose of providing funds for the construction, acquisition, extension, enlargement, and improvement of sewers or water works, or both, by any county, municipality or township other than Philadelphia, shall be considered a debt of such county, municipality or township within the meaning of section eight, article nine, of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, or of this amendment, to the extent that such obligations and the interest thereon are not paid for by sewer rentals or charges imposed upon users of the improvement without any further liability being imposed on such county, municipality or township with respect thereto.

Where any county, municipality or township shall issue obligations to provide for any improvement authorized hereinafter, it may also issue obligations to provide for the interest and sinking fund charges thereon, until said improvement shall have been completed and in operation for a period of one year, and in the case of obligations issued in accordance with clause (a) of this section, said county, municipality or township shall incur no liability to levy a tax to pay said interest and sinking fund charges until after said properties shall have been operated by said county, municipality or township during said period of one year.

Any county, municipality or township, other than Philadelphia, authorized by law to issue obligations, may incur indebtedness for any of the purposes in this amendment set forth in excess of seven per centum and not exceeding ten per centum of the assessed value of taxable property therein, if said increase of indebtedness shall have been approved by three-fifths (3/5) of the electors voting at a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law.
