There survive him a daughter, Rebecca C., and a son, E. Cresswell; also, a sister, Mrs. John T. McCormick, of State College.

He was successful as an attorney, and was elected solicitor for the City of Erie.

His first school work on leaving the one-room school in Potter township was in Centre Hall. He attained the age of 82 years.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from his home in Erie, and burial made in that city.

TEACHERS' UNION RAPS GREEN FOR BACKING G.O.P.

It is "inconceivable" that any laborer or man, sincerely interested in the workers of Pennsylvania, can endorse a candidate of the Republican party—"particularly such a one as Senator James J. Davis."

That assertion was made in a letter by the American Federation of Teachers, Local 192, an A. F. of L. affiliate, to William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, on Saturday.

The letter was in response to one from Green urging support of Davis' candidacy for reelection on the Republican ticket to the U. S. Senate.

The teachers' union, after taking Green to task for his "meddling" in Pennsylvania politics, endorsed the entire Democratic slate, following the lead of the State Federation of Labor's executive council.

"We remember," said the letter to Green, "that during the Pennsylvania primaries, you bitterly assailed John L. Lewis for 'meddling' in Pennsylvania politics. Wherein is your action (in urging support for Davis) any different from that which you criticized in Mr. Lewis?"

"As teachers, for the first time in the history of the State, we have had enacted into law a tenure bill which is probably the finest in the entire country. For the first time in our professional lives, we Pennsylvania teachers are protected from the whims of willful school administrators, or the 'big stick' of threatening politicians, and as long as we remain competent teachers, are secure in our positions.

"It was the same Democratic Administration that gave us sabbatical leave (one year off in every seven, with part pay), a practice widespread for a long time throughout the entire United States, but present for the first time here in Pennsylvania.

"As members of organized labor generally, we are proud of the labor record of the present Democratic Administration for the many pro-labor laws passed, laws undreamed-of in previous Republican administrations.

"We point specifically to the laws setting up a State Labor Relations Board, to the law curbing strike-breaking, to the workmen's compensation act, unemployment compensation, the 44-hour work-week law and to laws protecting the civil liberties of the citizens of the State."

The union, said the letter, signed by Secretary Aaron H. Kerman, is "pledged to do all in our power to elect the Democratic slate—in the interest of the teachers, the workers, and the welfare of the State generally."
