FORMER SENATOR CULBERTSON DECLARES FOR JONES

Former Republican State Senator Fred W. Culbertson, of the 31st Senatorial district, informed Jones that he had been a Republican all his life but would vote for him because Jones was opposed to Joe Grundy. "Grundy told me that if I voted for a bill he wanted defeated, I wouldn't go back to Harrisburg," Culbertson told Jones and reporters at the rally in Lewisport. "That was in 1926 or 1927, and the bill was to increase the rate of workmen's compensation from \$12 to \$20 a week. "I told Grundy that he had threatened me once before and to go to hell. I was in favor of liberalizing workmen's compensation whether Grundy liked it or not. And I voted for the bill. "Well, I didn't go back. I was defeated for re-election by the money that Grundy dumped into one of my three counties. That was Cumberland."

Deaths

SMITH.—The community was shocked on receiving information from the Centre County hospital on Monday evening that Miss Catharine Grace Smith had died at 6:15 o'clock following an operation performed at 11:00 a. m. that day.

X-ray pictures of the patient revealed a complete obstruction in the bowels, and complications. Miss Smith became violently ill at her home in Centre Hall early Friday morning, and at 5:00 o'clock p. m. the hospital ambulance called for her. Later the pain subsided and the patient became cheerful.

Miss Smith was the only daughter of Isaac C. and Margaret Witmer Smith, and was born in Loganton, December 26, 1868, making her age at death 69 years, 9 months and 21 days.

There survive two brothers, H. Witmer Smith, Milesburg, and James W. Smith, Williamsport. One brother, Clyde, is deceased.

She came to Centre Hall with her parents forty-one years ago and lived here continuously since. Upon the death of her parents she retained the well-known Witmer home. Later her brother Clyde and Mrs. Smith became a part of the family and upon the death of Mr. Smith, his wife, Mrs. Lavan Smith, continued to live with her sister-in-law, doing so until death separated them.

Miss Smith was greatly interested in community affairs, and gave personal aid to many community movements. She held various political appointments with mere pliancy returns, but more frequently gave valuable service where there was no emolument. Her home was always open to a large circle of friends and relatives. There are many individuals, families, children and groups who shared in her hospitality.

She was an active worker in the Presbyterian church, Sunday school and Missionary society, regularly attended the meetings and amply contributed to their support.

Funeral services will be held from the home at 2:00 o'clock this (Thursday) afternoon, conducted by her pastor, Rev. J. M. Kirkpatrick, and burial made in the local cemetery.

McCUMMONS.—Mrs. Bertha A. McCummons of Altoona died Friday afternoon at the Altoona hospital where she was admitted September 24, after a long illness.

Born July 15, 1873 at Spring Mills, she was a daughter of Jacob J. and Harriet (Syler) Jamison. Her husband, Robert McCummons, died April 15th, 1936. Mrs. McCummons was a member of the Bethany Lutheran church, also of the Order of the Eastern Star. Funeral services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. Saul, and burial made in Altoona. She was aged 65 years, 3 months and 23 days.

Twenty grandchildren and three great-grandchildren also survive. She was a member of the Georges Valley church.

Funeral services were held from Georges Valley church Tuesday afternoon with Rev. L. A. Wagner officiating. Burial was made in the cemetery adjoining the church.

THRIFTY TO OUTSTANDING

PENNS VALLEY RESIDENT

Titus M. Gramley, born in Rebersburg, July 31st, 1856, was a son of Samuel Gramley and Sarah (Small) Gramley. He was a direct descendant of Valentine Gramley who came from Wurtemberg, Germany, in 1749, his great-grandfather, Francis Gramley, having been a soldier in the Revolutionary War. His father was one of the pioneer educators of Brush Valley, teaching in the early country schools of that time, and early in life his son Titus, the subject of this sketch, prepared himself for teaching. At the age of 15 years he taught his first term of school and taught continuously for fourteen years. He held a Permanent Certificate granted by E. E. Higbee, State Supt. of Public Instruction, in 1887.

On retiring from this work he entered into a partnership with his brother, C. L. Gramley, in the mercantile business in Rebersburg. His health failed and he sold out this business after two years of success in that line.

In 1888 he formed a partnership business with R. G. Elenhart in the Spring Mills Creamery Co., serving first as book-keeper and later as manager of the company. In 1905 Mr. Gramley and his son, Windom C. Gramley, became sole owners of the plant and continued to operate the business very successfully until 1925, when he retired.

During the 39 years he was a citizen of Spring Mills he was a leader in the business, social and church life of that community. He was a life long member of the Lutheran church, holding various church offices and giving his support financially and physically to the work of the church. He was largely responsible for the organization of the Lutheran congregation in Spring Mills and later in the erection of the church building, supporting it liberally.

He was active in Sunday school work as superintendent and teacher. He rendered fifty years service as a teacher for which the State Sabbath School Association presented him with a gold medal. He was a pioneer in the work of the Layman's Movement, also in the Brotherhood of the church. For a time he held the office of president of the latter in the Central Pennsylvania Synod. He was also chosen as a delegate from his Synod to the General Synod when it met in Mansfield, Ohio, in 1897.

He was president of the joint council of the Penns Valley charge for twenty-one years, appreciating the perfect co-operation of "the fine group of men" as he termed them.

Mr. Gramley had sturdy individualistic tendencies and strove to attain the highest in the affairs of the home, the church, the school and the community. He regarded the sanctity and the comforts of a good home requisite to right living and afforded his children every educational advantage within his power.

In 1927 Mr. Gramley moved with his family, then consisting of wife and daughter, to Millheim. He became a member of St. John's Lutheran church there. Twelve years ago he became an invalid, the last seven and one-half years of which time he was confined to his bed. During all that time he was most patient,—a lesson in Christian fortitude.

He is survived by his wife, the former Agnes Loose; a daughter, Miss Orpha, at home; and four sons, viz., S. Ward Gramley, Millheim; Windom C., Millheim; Bruce S., Mt. Vernon, N. Y.; and Eugene T., Lewisport. A brother, C. H. Gramley, of Rebersburg, and Mrs. Naomi J. Heckman, of Ridgeway, also survive.

Funeral services were held from his late home, Friday, October 7, 1938, at 2:30 p. m., conducted by his pastor, Rev. O. E. Freeman. Interment in Fairview cemetery, Millheim.

M. A. Sankey and wife of Chance Creek called on friends one day last week.

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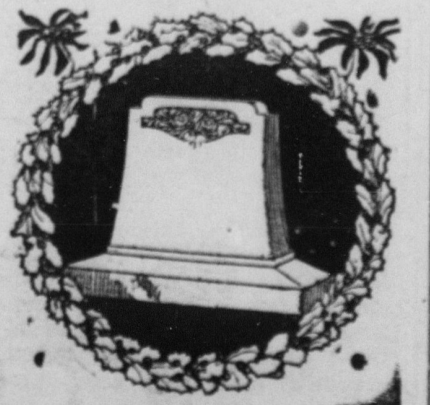
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BOALSBURG
