P. O. DEPARTMENT ASKS COOPERATION OF RURALITES

The post office department is asking rural residents to co-operate in reducing rural free delivery expenses to some extent by placing their mail boxes on roads open to travel in all kinds of weather, so that when roads are badly drifted their mail may be delivered without "excessive financial expenditure or undue physical exertion."

Patrons on rural lines are also urged to induce local and State highway departments to cut weeds along the roadsides, thus preventing drifts.

The Post Office Department is not aiming to curtail rural mail service, but is pointing to means, if applied, to obtain uninterrupted service during periods likely to come in this latitude during the winter months.

MARKER FOR SCOUT MASSACRE IN 14-MILE NARROWS

A large stone the shape of a coffin is to be dedicated on Friday afternoon, November 11, as a marker commemorating the massacre of three scouts at French Jacob's Mill during the Revolutionary War. The marker will be erected in the 14-Mile Narrows. The stone was brought from Sand Mountain, near the site of the grist mill located along Rapid Run.

French Jacob, the first white man to penetrate that section of Union county, operated the grist mill which marked one of the outposts of civilization at that time. Three scouts, traveling from post to post to keep settlers informed of the whereabouts of Indians, stopped at the mill for lodging, and while they were at the run washing they were killed by the redskins. Jacob, attending duties elsewhere, escaped.

GIFFORD PINCHOT

Former Governor Who Polled More Than 450,000 Votes in the Spring Primary,
Breaks Silence With Bitter, Sharp Indictment

The Text of Pinchot's Statement is as follows :
"I'M A REPUBLICAN BUT I TAKE NO ORDER FROM ANY BOSS. I'M AN INDEPENDENT PROGRESSIVE REPUBLICAN. THAT IS WHERE I ALWAYS HAVE STOOD. THAT IS WHERE I STAND TODAY.
"LIKE SO MAY OTHER PROGRESSIVE REPUBLICANS THROUGHOUT THE STATE, I AM TAKING NO PART IN A CAMPAIGN RUN BY AND FOR ANNENBERG AND PEW AND THEIR SUBORDINATES.
"I hate to think of what that pair would do to the church people, organized labor and to those who depend on different kinds of relief, if they got the chance.
"I HATE TO THINK OF WHAT WOULD HAPPEN TO THE FARMERS, WORKERS, SMALL BUSINESSMEN AND THE CLEAN AND DECENT PEOPLE OF THIS STATE, IF ANNENBERG AND PEW SHOULD SUCCEED IN GETTING CONTROL OF PENNSYLVANIA OR EVEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES."
