More than a thousand high school students attended this meeting which in former years had been held at Hershey during the Christmas holidays.

Harold Bradford, sports editor; William Kerlin, associate editor; James Meeker, advertising manager; Russell Reish, art editor, and Jean Ross, business manager, represented The Tiger. Miriam Homan and Francis Runkle also attended the conven-
