School Retains County Soccer Championship by Defeating East Penns Valley High in Triable Struggle.

Gregg Team Retains County Soccer Championship—The Gregg Twp. Vocational School soccer team retained the County Championship by defeating East Penns Valley High of Millheim on the college practice field last Friday by a score of 2 to 1. The two teams had played to a 2-2 tie during their only game of the regular season, and ended the regular season in a tie at the top of the league. Two previous play-off games had ended in ties, both games having gone into extra periods. It was in the last extra period of the third play-off game last Friday that the tie was finally broken, when Spayd dribbled for the Gregg boys nearly half the length of the field to shoot the deciding score into the East Penn goal. As may be readily seen, all the games were closely contested, and were marked by spirited play by both teams. Acts of good sportsmanship were exhibited by those concerned many times during the contesting of these games and it is creditable that this fine spirit between schools and individuals exists, even though the issue to be decided is that of a championship. The Gregg officials, coaches, students and players salute East Penns Valley High for their fine sportsmanship throughout this series of games. Coach Bielecki is to be congratulated in his first year at East Penn for the fine high standard of clean play and sportsmanship that he and his boys exhibit.

The Gregg team will defend their Central Pennsylvania championship, earned last year, when they meet Covington H. S., champions of Tioga county, this week in the first of a series of play-off games held under the direction of Bill Jeffrey, Penn State Soccer Coach.

Magazine Campaign Starting 25th—The annual Curtis Publishing Co. Magazine Campaign will be conducted through the Gregg Twp. Vocational School during the week of November 25. This campaign is the only one conducted during the year for the purpose of raising funds for the various activities of the high school, through the sale of magazines. Last year the school realized a profit of approximately \$65.00 which aided materially in conducting the various activities. The school has appreciated the support of the public from year to year in the enterprise. One-half of the subscription price of the magazines is retained by the local school. Individual prizes are also given to pupils.

Christmas Seals to be sold in Twp.—Christmas Seals will be mailed to various individuals in the township this year, following the plan used for the first time in Gregg township last year. County leaders report that every township and borough in this section is carrying on the sale through the mail this year. The seals sell for \$1.00 for 100, with 80 per cent of the funds being returned to the local district for health work in the schools. Last year and for a number of years the Gregg township schools have conducted a pre-school clinic with the use of the funds, as well as carrying on additional health work, and the purchasing of health and playground equipment. Last year's response was very generous in Gregg township, and indicated the interest the citizens have in the health of their boys and girls. It is hoped that as fine a response will be indicated this year. Seals may also be purchased at the local school.

Two-Day Vacation—The schools of the township will be closed for a two-day Thanksgiving vacation on Thursday and Friday of this week, opening again on the following Monday morning. The Christmas vacation will extend throughout the week of December 25. No other vacation periods have been set aside for the remainder of the year.

FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Store Leafy Crops—Home gardeners often store celery and Chinese cabbage in cold cellars, coldframes, or trenches while endive is either stored by one of these methods or covered with waterproof paper and straw. Vegetable gardeners at the Pennsylvania State College say that is essential to keep the roots moist.

Mulch Strawberries—It is best to mulch strawberry beds after the ground is frozen, Penn State fruit specialists point out. This prevents alternate freezing and thawing which often heaves some plants out of the ground, seriously injures the roots of others, and in general reduces the yield of fruit.

Select Brood Sows — Selection of sows and gilts for breeding from large litters is a good practice, report Penn State animal husbandmen. Placing them on full feed for several weeks before breeding usually results in an increase of 10 to 20 per cent in the number of pigs farrowed.

Grain Feed Varks—The amount of grain to feed dairy cows depends upon the breed and the volume of milk produced, explain Penn State dairymen. Knowledge and judgment of these matters aid in keeping production costs down.

Get Rid of Insects—Lady bugs, box elder plant bugs, and wasps often overwinter in houses, sheds, and other buildings, say Penn State entomologists. If they become a nuisance, windows may be opened on warm days and often they will leave.

Save the Soil—Soil erosion can be controlled by simple methods in farm practices, say Penn State agronomists.
