A society organized in Sellingsgrove, membership in which can be held only by persons able to speak "Pennsylvania Deitcha," on Tuesday evening held their seventh annual banquet. Members are scattered throughout all sections of the State, the request for admission being limited in order to accommodate the gatherings in the locality where the organization had its origin. Members and guests who attended the Tuesday evening banquet were Prof. J. F. Wetzel, Prof. R. S. Jamison, Prof. D. I. Graybill, F. P. Geary, P. H. Luse, and R. M. Smith, all of whom to a greater or lesser extent can master the Pennsylvania dialect.
