NEW VEGETABLE STRAINS GIVE PROMISING RESULTS

Numerous varieties of cabbage gave promising results in tests conducted at the Pennsylvania State College last summer. These included Early Seneca, Copenhagen Market, Green Acre, Racine Market, Chieftain Savoy, Large Early Red, Earliest of All, Red Danish, Penn State Ballhead, Quaker Hill Danish, Ferrys Hollander, Early Danish, Wisconsin Ball head, and Bugner.

Recommended cauliflower varieties are Super Snowball and Snowdrift of the early strains and Dania and Erfurt of the late types.

Varieties of carrot which best met the requirements for bunching and bulk trade are Selected Danvers, Supreme Half-long, Oregon Chantenay, Great Chantenay, Hutchinson and Louisiana Danvers. Nantes and Tender-sweet were excellent for home garden purposes.

Desirable celery varieties include Golden Plume (California); Easy Blanching, Gilt Edge Easy Blanching, Full Heart, Summer Pascal, Penn Pascal or Tall Emperor and Fordhook Emperor-Houser.

A wide range of choice exists for those interested in growing sweet corn. Narcross C15.6 or C6.13 are early, yellow strains; Narcross C13, P39, Spangcross P39.04 are early mid-season types; Whipcross C63 and Senecross P39 have thick ears; Golden Cross Bantam, Bloomcross P25, Quaker Hill XL and Iona P29.145 are late mid-season types; and Aroma Gold, Soother, Narcross and Bantam Evergreen Hybrid 933.524 are late strains.

Black Diamond, straight 8, A & C and National Pickling are good cucumbers. New Hampshire Hybrid and Black Beauty are promising eggplants. Lettuce varieties of the crisp head type include Imperial 41, New York 515 and Imperial 847. Delicious, Pride or Wisconsin, Honey Rock and Hearts of Gold are top muskmelon varieties.

Onions which give excellent results include Early Yellow Globe, Brigham Yellow Globe, Mountain Danvers, Ebenezer, Yellow Dutch of Strasburg, Riverside Sweet Spanish and Bottle.

Desirable peas for the home garden are World Record, Dark Podded Thomas Laxton, Asgrow 40 or Stride-along and Alderman. Peppers include Harris Wonder, Early California, Oak-wonder, California Wonder, King of the North, World Beater, Rocky Ford, Ruby King and Black Strain.

Stokesdale is one of the best early varieties of tomatoes; John Baer, Bonney Best, Landreth, Eagle, Jewel are excellent second early types; Pritchard and Early Rutgers 500-78 are early mid-season strains; and Marglobe and Rutgers are the best for the main crop.
