DECLINE IN YEAR 1938
Receipts from the sale of motor vehicle licenses and drivers' licenses in the calendar year 1938 totalled \$34,298,051, a decrease of \$3,800,000 from the 1937 total of \$38,120,355 and a decrease of \$1,032,000 from the 1936 total of \$38,330,900.
The decline is largely due to the fact that drivers' licenses were reduced from \$2.00 to \$1.00 in 1938.

Will Rogers' Humorous Story

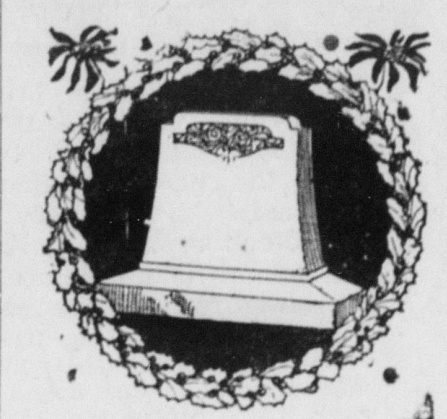
