Court Rules in Favor of Gregg Twp. Maintenance Case-Because the Centre County Commissionrs failed to appear in court to establish their freedom from responsibility for mainof a Gregg township man in a State institution, Judge Wallace Smith of Clearfield county, in an opinion filed last week finds Centre county responsible for the payment of \$1,835.04 to the Danville State hospital. Judge Smith specially presided at the hearing in Bellefonte some time ago. The county is to pay the costs of litigation.

According to the ruling, the Commissioners should have formally disclaimed responsibility for the Gregg township man's upkeep before Janwary 1, 1938, when the county system for administering aid to the poor became effective. There is no reason, Judge Smith finds, why Gregg township which now has no district poor setup should be made to pay the bill. Legal action in the matter resulted when the Commissioners announced their intention of levying a special tax in Gregg township to take
