Calvin Albright of State College, on trial on f. and b. charges, was found guilty and costs placed on him. Unable to furnish a \$500 bond, he was sent to jail.

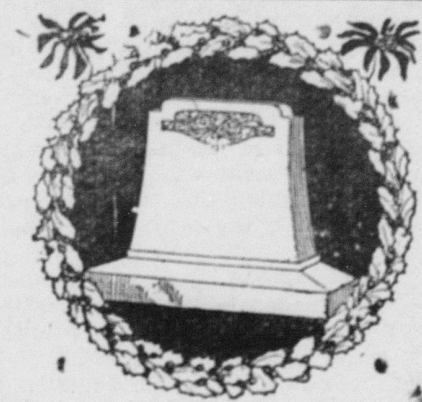

MODERN ARRANGEMENT



A smart modern arrangement that's possible where space is limited. A pin-to-wall type lamp is used to give good reading light, leaving the end table free for flowers, books and smoking equipment.

OUR picture shows a compact modern treatment of a sofa or day bed in a small room. Notice how well the wall type lamp seems to fit this arrangement, taking up very little room and yet giving scientifically correct light for reading.

Many Uses
Home decorators are finding these pin-to-wall lamps the solution to many home lighting problems. In the first place, they are simply hung on the wall with a push pin as you would a picture. They fit into all sorts of odd corners that need light, where a table or floor lamp would be impossible. For instance, when a small desk must be placed in a corner, a wall lamp gives plenty of light on the work, leaving the whole desk top free for books and papers. Twin wall lamps can be hung on either side of the dressing table mirror to bring the light at just the right height for a person sitting there.

A wall lamp can be put to good use over the breakfast table or over the kitchen range or sink when no fixture has been provided there. Some of the clever new lamps that are especially suited to the kitchen are designed to include clocks or condiment sets.
If you have had trouble finding a comfortable light for reading

in bed, try a pin-to-wall. Where there are twin beds in a room, a wall lamp can be hung over each bed, or one large lamp hung between the beds. In the rumpus room, a pin-to-wall can be hung over the game table and is out of the way so there's no danger of it being tipped over if the game gets a little wild.

Good Light
Pin-to-walls not only fit in many places that are difficult to light—but they give good light. Most of them have a plastic or glass diffusing bowl which permits the use of a 100 watt bulb and gives pleasing, glareless light. This type should always be chosen wherever reading, writing or any other close seeing work is to be done.
