FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Discontinue Light on Layers—With the increase in the number of daylight hours, many poultrymen will discontinue the use of light in their laying flocks. Poultry extension specialists at the Penna. State College suggest that the use of light be lessened gradually.

Preparing the Home Garden—Unless the home garden is extremely small, the cheapest and quickest way of getting it in shape is with a team, a plow, and a harrow, say Penn State extension specialists in vegetable gardening. The garden should be prepared for planting as soon as the condition of the soil permits.

Seedlings Improved by Transplanting—Seedlings give the best results if transplanted when 1-2 to 2 inches tall, according to Penn State specialists. Because the seed is sown thickly, plants will become spindly and undesirable unless given more space in which to grow.

Prune Raspberry Canes Now—A better crop of raspberries will be produced if weak canes are removed and the remainder headed back, say pomology extension specialists at Penn State. Early spring is the best time to prune.

Keep Cemetery Turfs Green—A fine green turf can be grown in cemeteries by following the same principles used in the management of the home lawn, say extension agronomists at Penn State. Lime and fertilizer are particularly important.

Brooding Turkey Poults—Poults can be brooded in the same way as chicks with different types of brooders, brooder houses, or batteries, according to Penn State poultry extension specialists. They require a slightly higher temperature than chicks, ranging from 90 to 95 degrees Fahrenheit at the edge of the hover during the first week.

The Republican House of Representatives passed finally and sent to the Senate on Tuesday the emergency tax program originated by the Earle Administration. It will collect 165,000,000 in revenue.
