ments. Born in Selinsgrove, the Rev. Mr. Barry was a son of the late Rev. David Rittenhouse Porter Barry and Rebecca Kuhn Barry. He had lived for a time in Huntingdon and Pittsburgh and was graduated from the theological seminary and college of Susquehanna University. He completed his theological studies in 1904.

He served pastorates in Bellefonte, Centre Hall, Cumberland, Md., and Baltimore, Md. In 1918 he assumed charge of St. Lake's church, Baltimore, and was there until he took the pastorate of St. Peter's church, Highspire, in 1925. In 1908, he was secretary of the General synod of the Lutheran Churches, Washington.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Anna (Mitterling) Barry, a daughter, Miss Roberta, and three sons, Bliss, David and John Toeodore, all at home; four sisters, Mrs. Cora B. Lee and the Misses F. Mae, I. Myrtle and Susquehanna Barry, all of Selinsgrove, and two brothers, Bert A. and Otto L. Barry, both of Pittsburgh. 
