REV. FRED. W. BARRY PASSES ON IN HARRISBURG HOSPITAL

Rev. Fred W. Barry, pastor of St. Peter's Lutheran church at Highspire for fourteen years, and a former pastor on the Penns Valley Lutheran charge, died Friday night in the Harrisburg hospital, following an illness dating back to the beginning of this year, since which time he was not able to fill his ministerial appointments.

Born in Selinsgrove, the Rev. Mr. Barry was a son of the late Rev. David Rittenhouse Porter Barry and Rebecca Kuhn Barry. He had lived for a time in Huntingdon and Pittsburgh and was graduated from the theological and seminary and college of Susquehanna University. He completed his theological studies in 1904.

He served pastorates in Bellefonte, Centre Hall, Cumberland, Md., and Baltimore, Md. In 1918 he assumed charge of St. Luke's church, Baltimore, and was there, until he took the pastorate of St. Peter's church, Highspire, in 1925. In 1928, he was secretary of the General Synod of the Lutheran Churches, Washington.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Anna (Mittling) Barry, a daughter, Miss Roberta, and three sons, Bliss, David and John Theodore, all at home; four sisters, Mrs. Cora B. Lee and the Misses F. Mae, I. Myrtle and Susquehanna Barry, all of Selinsgrove, and two brothers, Bert A. and Otto L. Barry, both of Pittsburgh.

Mrs. Barry was reared in Centre Hall, where her marriage took place twenty-six years ago. She is a sister of D. C. Mittling of town.

Services were held in St. Peter's church, Highspire, at 1:00 p. m., Tuesday, at which the body laid in state from 10:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m., on Tuesday. Burial was made in the Union cemetery, Selinsgrove, the Rev. M. R. Hamsher, president of the East Pennsylvania Synod of the United Lutheran Churches, officiating.

Rev. Barry was pastor of the Centre Hall Lutheran church, his second in the ministry, from June, 1911, to October, 1914.

BECHTOL.—Mrs. Mary Alice Bechtol, widow of the late Nathaniel Bechtol, died at her home in Millheim following an illness of several months duration of infirmities incident to her advanced age.

She was a daughter of George and Kathryn Deabler and was born in Miles township November 1, 1857, being therefore aged 81 years, 5 months and 14 days. Her husband preceded her to the grave eighteen years ago. Surviving, however, are four sons, George C. Bechtol, of Woodward; Harry E. of Pine Grove Mills; William H., at home, and John E., of State College. Also surviving is a brother, Perry Deabler, of Lock Haven.

Interment was made at Millheim on Monday of last week in the Rebersburg cemetery, beside that of her husband. Rev. Housen officiated.

SHAY.—Mrs. Elizabeth Shay, daughter of Phillip and Emaline Lucas Confer, aged 72 years, died at Milesburg at the home of a daughter.

SHATTUCK.—Harold B. Shattuck, connected with Penn State College since 1901, when he was appointed assistant in civil engineering, died at his home, 122 West Beaver avenue, State College, early Tuesday morning.

Since his appointment at Penn State he held several posts at the institution and on retiring was associate professor of railroad engineering. He was also engineer for State College borough and surveyor for Centre county.

His wife, formerly Miss Elizabeth Stewart, died in 1934. They had no children.

He was born in Nashua, N. H., in 1873. Surviving are two brothers, Arthur G. and Roger C., of Nashua, and two sisters, Helen, Burlington, Vt. and Fanny C., who has made her home with her brother in State College.

Funeral services will be held on Friday in the State College Presbyterian church and burial made in the Branch cemetery.
