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TWO PLEAD GUILTY IN JOSEPH BRUNO ESCAPE

Rocco Garramone and Jesse Nilo, both of Hazelton, pleaded guilty before Judge Benjamin R. Jones to conspiring in the escape of Joseph Bruno, of Schuylkill county, from the Potsville jail in December, 1936, and were sentenced to one to two years in Luzerne county prison.

Garramone pleaded guilty to charges of conspiracy and bribery in aiding the escape of Bruno, serving a life-term for fatally wounding four persons during a political parade in Kellays. Garramone kept Bruno at his home in Hazelton following the prison break. Nilo admitted driving Bruno to Hazelton immediately after the escape.
