When city dailies, in giving an ac unt of the tragic death of two boys y drowning near Centre Hall, stated he sink hole into which the boys fell was 'from 6 to 8 feet in diameter,' we must conclude that city editors and city people in general have little knowedge of what a Nittany Mountain sink-hole is. The slope of Nittany Mountain for miles west of Penns Cave is dotted with these sink-holes Some geologists believe the waters rising in Penns Cave may come from an underground course along the mountain, which causes a sinking in of the earth in places. The writer, as a boy, hunted game along Nittany mountain and often stood in awe of the gigantic holes in the earth, which could well accommodate a half-dozen good size houses. He often descended the slope: of some of these "sinks" to retrieve a squirrel shot from a tree on its banks. While we are speaking of the larger size of these natural "sinks," the one referred to as the locale of Saturday's drowning was in no wise one of these mammoth holes,
