Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon with the Rev. Charles E. Diehl of Alexandria, formerly pastor of the Salona-Lamar Methodist church, officiating. Interment will be made in the Unionville cemetery.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Pine Hall Reformed church with Rev. A. S. Asendorf officiating. Interment was made in the Pine Hall cemetery.

STOVER.—John Stover, native of Haines township, died at his home in Berrien Springs, Mich., June 7, according to advice received by relatives. Mr. Stover was not in the best of health for the past three or four years, having suffered several heart attacks, and it is thought that a sudden attack a few weeks ago was the direct cause of his death.

For many years a resident of Woodward, he conducted a distillery in that community until the early 1900's, retiring from that occupation about thirty-five years ago. He was married to Miss Jane Kettner who passed to her reward about ten years ago. Surviving are the daughter, Mary, wife of W. Allen Hess of Yeagertown, at whose home he died, and two sons—Calvin W. Eby of New York City and John G. Eby of Portage.

He was a lifelong member of the Woodward Evangelical church. Funeral services were held Saturday in Yeagertown, with the Lutheran minister in that community in charge. Further services were held Saturday afternoon in Woodward Union cemetery where interment was made.

Also surviving are four sisters and two brothers: Mrs. Ella Diehl and Miss Emma Sholl, both of Rebersburg; Mrs. Elizabeth Bradford of Middletown, Conn.; Lee Sholl and Mr. Lillie Baker of Pittsburgh, and Wm. Sholl of Weatherly.

Mrs. Waite was a consistent member of the Rebersburg Evangelical church and her pastor, Rev. Roy A. Babcock, conducted services in the Diehl home Monday afternoon. Interment was made in the Rebersburg Evangelical cemetery.

BOTTORF.—Lynn Bottorf died Thursday afternoon at his home in Bellefonte aged 59 years. He was born at Maternville. He is survived by a wife, formerly Anna Maulhead. Burial was made in Gray's cemetery on Saturday.

NEW ROAD NEWS

A report had gained some circulation that the removal of the power shovel at the B. W. Ripka farm home to a gravel hill immediately south of the "Red" bridge, was the result of a disagreement with Mr. Ripka for some reason not stated. This however is an error. The purpose of moving operations to the gravel hill was to form a solid foundation for the new road through the Ripka meadow to the south before expected rains set in. This purpose has already been accomplished.
