BOND C. WHITE IN STATEMENT TO VOTERS OF CENTRE COUNTY

Many of the citizens of Centre County are familiar with my career, which has been an open book. My interests have always been in Centre County. I was born in Axe Mann, Spring township, Centre County, Pa., 38 years ago and have resided there all my life.

I attended the Axe Mann grade schools and the Pleasant Gap and Bellefonte High schools. My first work

was on the farms during the summer school vacations beginning at eleven years of age. Later I clerked in the Axe Mann store and post office. I worked in the Bellefonte Match Factory and with my father at the carpenter trade. At the age of 20 years I entered business for myself in the general store at Axe Mann.

In 1923 I married Adaline E. Boyer daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. B. Boyer, Blanchard St., Bellefonte, Pa. In that same year I sold the store and built the Edgefonte Service Station where I worked every day of the year from 8:00 A. M. until midnight or later, with Christmas Day as the only exception. That day I closed at 5:00 o'clock in the evening. It was there that I met many of the good people of Centre county and the friendships made then still remain and have grown with the years.

In 1927 I sold the service station and entered the employ of the Gulf Refining Co. in Pittsburgh. I left their employ in 1930 to accept a position as general salesman for the Standard Oil Company of Pa., which was then coming into Penna.

In 1932 I was appointed to the high labor post of Secretary to the Workmen's Compensation Board of Penna.

In 1935 I was elected Prothonotary of Centre county and took office on January 6, 1935. My fellow Prothonotaries of Penna. have twice honored me; in 1937-1938 I was Vice-President of their state organization and for 1938-1939 I was their President.

I am the first Prothonotary of Centre county who ever shared the earnings of the office with the coun-

ty. I have paid all of the expenses of the office and have paid to the County Commissioners for the use of the county the sum of \$2,881.87.

I belong to the following: Methodist church, Republican Organization of Centre County; Young Men's Christian Association of Bellefonte; Bellefonte Community Welfare Fund; Centre County Hospital Corporation; Elk's Club, Bellefonte; Logan Grange, Pleasant Gap; Bellefonte Lodge Free and Accepted Masons; Bellefonte, Royal Arch Chapter; Constans Commandery; Kiwanis Club and the Pleasant Gap Fire Company.

The people of Centre County have always elected their Prothonotary to a second term. I ask the favorable consideration of the Voters, on a record of a lifetime (33 years) faithful, devoted and unselfish service in the welfare of my native county of Centre, in my campaign for a second term as Prothonotary.

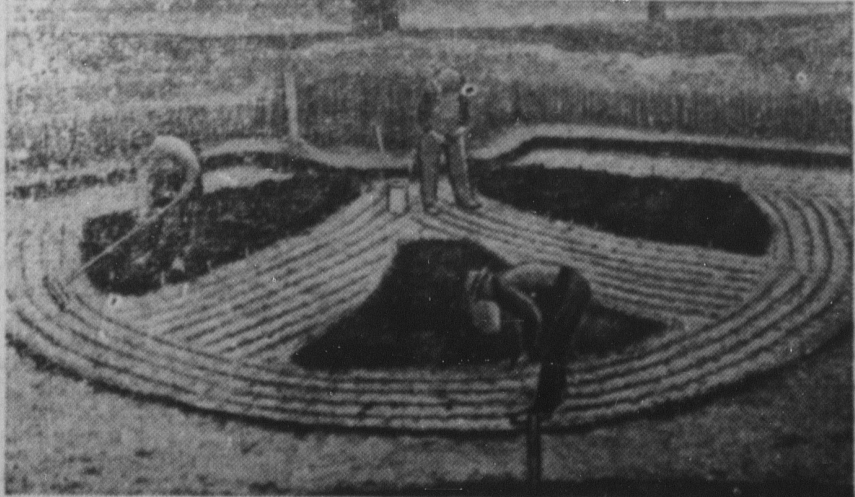
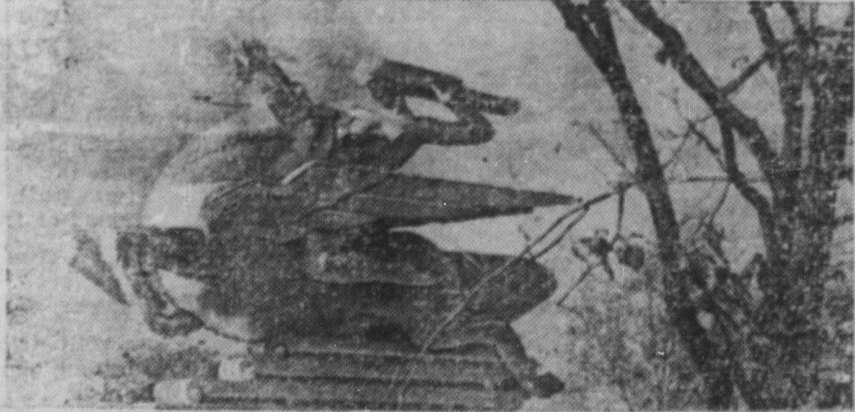
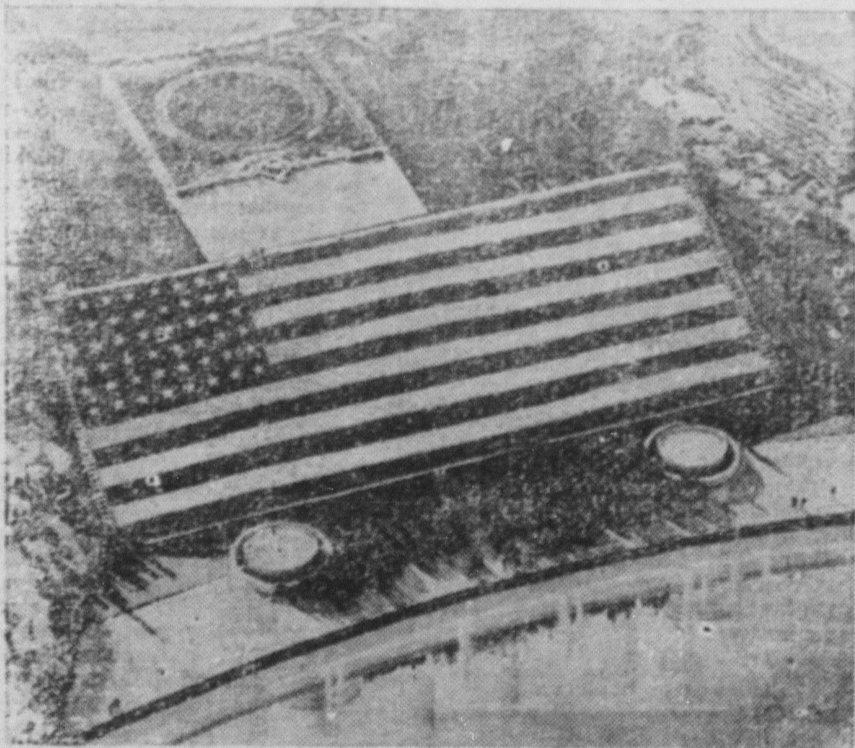

The recent rains will have a pronounced effect on the hay crop throughout the valley.
