FARM CALENDAR

- Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Care Improves Egg Quality—Care given eggs after they are laid is probably the most important factor affecting egg quality.

Asparagus Requires Attention—To be productive, an asparagus bed needs the right care during the summer.

Planning for Next Year's Blooms—Judicious pruning of such spring blooming shrubs as spiraea, mock oranges, lilacs, viburnums and forsythia as soon as they finish blossoming will give them ample time to produce new wood for the production of a good crop of blooms next year.

Spray for Juniper Scale—Spraying Juniper evergreens with a nicotine sulfate spray will halt the inroads of the juniper scale insects.

Legumes Are Profitable—The legumes—the clovers and alfalfa—help maintain the fertility of the soil and reduce the costs of feeding livestock, particularly dairy cows.

Spraying Kills Elm Leaf Beetles—The large population of elm leaf beetles which is attacking elm trees this summer can be checked by spraying the undersides of the leaves with lead-arsenate, using a high-pressure sprayer.

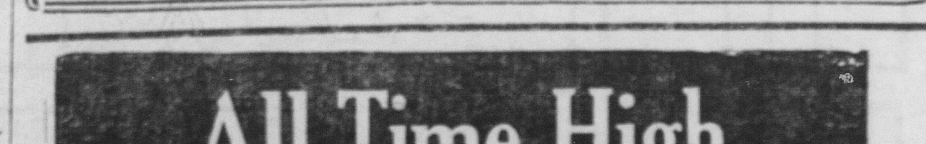
